Rabbit Drive Planned
A rabbit drive will be one of the projects of the Umatilla county farm bureau this fall, says Fred Benning, county agent. The drive will be started after snow falls, as the animals do not eat poisoned alfalfa unless other food is covered by snow. Poisoned wheat heads will be used in the section where rabbits do not eat alfalfa. Mr. Benning says that the rabbit pest is 30 per cent less than last year because of the campaign held last year. The number has not decreased greatly in the railroad land as poison was not used extensively there, nor were many killed in the territory back from land east of upper Butter Creek where rabbits refused poisoned alfalfa. Here the wheat will be used this year. Strychnine is to be bought in advance and all will be in readiness for the drive.
