DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN COST FAR BELOW G. O. P.

- WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—(A. P.)—The democratic national committee had expended \$699,671 up to October 21, according to a report filed with the house of representatives clerk by Treasurer Marsh today. Total receipts were \$877,943. This compares with receipts of \$3,466,019 and expenditures of \$2,741,503 by republican national committee as reported yesterday by Treasurer Upham.
- Cox is listed as a subscriber of \$5000 to the democratic fund, the largest subscriber being H. A. Wroe of Austin, Texas, with \$20,000, and the second largest, Reimbrandt Peale, of Carrollton, Pa., with \$10,000.
