### ACCORD KERRIGAN SPLENDID SUPPORT IN BALZAC STORY

An outstanding feature of J. Warren Kerrigan's latest Branton production, "The Dream Cheater," now showing at the Pastime Theatre, and distributed by W. W. Hodgkinson, is the perfection of its casting. Some of the best known players of the screen and two former stars of the legitimate stage support Kerrigan in this picture.

As Brandon McShane, scholar, dreamer and philosopher, Kerrigan departs entirely from light comedy and romance and gives the public a real glimpse of his abilities as a dramatic actor. McShane is a writer of social and economic problems. Upon the loss of his father and the family fortune, he becomes a wanderer of the streets, spending his nights in a cheap tenement apart from his friends. One day he meets a mysterious Persian prince, who gives him a magic talisman. Although this charm has the power to bring its owner anything he may wish for McShane soon finds it an obsession. He becomes half-crazed with dread of it. Finally a girl appears, who starts him on the road to happiness.

Fritzi Brunette, the talented young actress who played opposite Kerrigan in "The Dream Cheater" and "The Lord Loves the Irish," does some splendid work as "Pauline Mahon," the little sunshine maid of the tenement. Through her influence McShane shakes off his superstitious dread and frees himself from the magic talisman.

Joseph J. Dowling, who was starred in Klaw and Arlanger's New York presentation of "The Kentucky Colonel" and featured in the "Miracle Man," is excellently cast as the subtle Oriental, Prince Shih. Alice Wilson performs with her usual finesse as "Mimi Gascolme," leader of a raddical group, and Thomas Guine does some clever character work in the role of the rheumatic old rouser, "Fitz-George."

### UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA HOLDS SECESSION RIGHT

CAPETOWN, Union of South Africa, Oct. 25.—The Free State National congress has adopted resolutions proclaiming the sovereign will of the people of the Union of South Africa, their right to self determination, their right to secede from Great Britain or break any existing bond between the Union and Great Britain, and declaring opposition to a closer imperial union.

The resolutions advised, however, that no decisive steps regarding secession be taken unless a majority of the people express such a desire through a referendum.
