HIS HONEYMOON DISTURBED BY "HIS BRIDAL NIGHT"

"His Bridal Night," which can be seen Thursday night at the Alta Theatre, crashed through the fence of a magnificent Tarrytown estate, is disturbed the honeymoon of a wealthy New Yorker and his bride, and also ruined several hundred feet of good film.

The scene of the accident was a picturesque estate on the Hudson River at Tarrytown which is owned by a wealthy New York resident, and where his bride had been spending their honeymoon.

The machine which was used in the scene was a high-powered roadster of international fame. The camera was set to take in a portion of the state highway leading past the New Yorker's magnificent country estate. When Director Webb shouted "camera," Miss Brady eased in the clutch and the machine shot ahead. Just as it neared a curve in the road where the scene was to end, the car swerved to the right and crashed through the stone and cement fence which encircles the honeymooner's country home.

The fence at the point of collision was demolished and the front part of the roadster was also wrecked. Although Miss Brady was not thrown from the seat, she was severely shaken up, and her nerves suffered a distinct shock.

A treaty of peace was immediately signed between the honeymooners and the invading party, and reparation for all damages was one of the fourteen points. The thirteen other points were not mentioned, but they are believed to have included thirteen or more spokes from the wheels which were found scattered about the lawn of the estate.

BANDIT PARTY HALTS AS DRIVER IS KILLED

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 28.—(U. P.)—Two bandits were shot and killed, a third wounded and Motorcycle Officer Alder was injured Wednesday in a sensational gun battle between officers and a party of three supposed highwaymen near Elmonte yesterday. Resulting arrest, the bandits opened fire, injuring Alder, who fell from the running board of a deputy sheriff's auto. Officer Hamlin pursued the remaining two bringing them to a stop when he shot the driver of the car dead at the wheel, and seriously wounded the third.
