Uncertain Showing of Brazil Lowers Coffee Futures Market

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—The market for coffee futures was lower Thursday owing to the unsettled showing of Brazil and selling by brokers who were believed to be operating for Wall Street interests. Some thought that this might reflect developments in connection with the Brazilian loan, but there were no definite news in that respect and others thought the selling might be against spot holdings, although trade interests were buyers on the decline. The market opened 7 to 18 points lower and active months sold 15 to 23 points net lower during the morning with March touching 7.57. The price rallied to 8.04 on covering provided by former late cables from Brazil but eased off again under a continuation of the Wall street pressure, closing at 7.91. The general market closed at a net decline of 16 to 20 points. Closing bids: October 7.05; Dec. 7.22; January 7.45; March 7.91; May 8.19; July 8.50; Sept. 8.84. Spot coffee quiet; Rio 7 3/4 @ 8; Santos 11 1/4 @ 11 1/2.

Settlement of Coal Strike Helps Put Wheat Up

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—Wheat moved upward in price Thursday owing more or less to definite word of contingent settlement of the British coal strike. The close was nervous, 2 1/4 to 3 1/4c not higher, with Dec. 2.97 1/4 to 3.07 3/4 and March 3.01 1/4 to 3.11 1/4. Corn finished unchanged 7 1/2c higher and oats gained 1/4 to 3/8c. In provisions the outcome was a setback of 20c to 31 1/2c.

At First the wheat market showed a decided downward tendency due in a considerable degree to unexpected delay in British strike negotiations and to bearish contentions that the farm strike in this country had not developed to the extent which had been looked for. A sharp rally, however, followed the receipt of news that the British strike had been officially announced. Lifting of a railway embargo at Baltimore was an additional assistance to the bulls.

Reports that Nebraska farmers would burn corn this winter instead of coal was an influence for higher prices on corn and oats.

SCHOOLMEN ADVOCATE TAX ON MINE CONCERNS

HELENA, Mont., Oct. 28.—(A. P.)—Teachers and school trustees in the state are expected to advocate before the coming legislature a bill to place a license tax on mining, oil and hydro electric concerns for school purposes. The state teacher's association is expected to father the proposed tax bill by which, it is estimated, about \$500,000 could be raised. Under the bill, 75 per cent of the proceeds of the tax would go into the school fund and the remainder into the state's general fund. At present there is no special tax for schools.
