DOINGS OF THE DUFFS

Control in Wheat Market

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—Bulls had the advantage in the wheat market today owing largely to wheat reports from Argentina and to wheat expressed by a well known trade authority that the farm strike in the U. S. was serious. The market closed unsettled 1 1/2 to 1-1/2 net higher, with December 2.69 1/2 to 2.69 3/4 and March 2.02. Corn finished 1-1/4 to 1-5/8 up, and oats gained 1-3/8 to 1-3/4. In provisions the outcome varied from 25c decline to 25c advance.

More than usual significance was attached to Argentine wheat news inasmuch as wheat crop damage was limited, and any great impairment of yield in the southern hemisphere would be likely to bring about a more active European demand for supplies from the United States. Interest in wheat traders centered almost entirely, however, on developments touching the holding attitude of farmers. It was contended that notwithstanding that primary receipts continued liberal, an adequate test as to the amount of stoppage of rural selling would require at least ten days. Corn and oats borrowed their strength from wheat. Provisions were irregular.

Stock Exchange Shows Same Irregularity as Before

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Business on the stock exchange Friday differed in no important essentials from the irregular and hesitant movements of the preceding sessions of the week, the professional element again dominating the market.

The ebb and flow of prices continued to be governed by financial and industrial conditions, the former indicating further depletion of available funds and the latter presenting renewed signs of curtailed production and reduced payrolls.

Most of the day's call money was offered at 1/2 per cent, with the usual advance of 1/8 per cent at the finish. Developments of the day included the declaration of an initial dividend on shares of the New Orleans, Texas & Mexico railroad and unconfirmed reports of a heavy sales of copper for export at 15 to 15 1/4 a pound.

Aside from occasional pool activity in some of the local utilities and miscellaneous specialties, dealings centered in oils, steels, equipments and transportation, the latter mainly of the high grade. Short covering accounted for the brisk rally at the close, such stocks as U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, Baldwin Locomotives, Southern Pacific and Mexican Petroleum scoring net gains of one to nearly four points. Sales 500,000 shares. Trading in bonds dwindled, further irregularity being shown by domestic issues, although liberties closed at nominal gains. Total sales, par value, \$10,450,000. Old U. S. bonds unchanged on call.

Trade and Price Movement

Still Irregular Says Bradstreet

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Bradstreet today says:

The trade and price movement is more irregular, but on the whole rather less one-sided than in the preceding week, further retrograde movements in wheat trade production, employment, and prices seeming to be partially balanced by slight improvement in retail buying and a fairly distinct hardening in prices of farm products, which may or may not presage a turn in the hitherto ebbing tide of trade distribution. On what might be termed the constructive side of the situation is to be cited a slight increase in buying at retail—a quiet distinct gain from quiet to fair being noted from the apparent dead low point of last week—the cause of this being, apparently, the advent of more normal weather conditions west and south, though more attractive prices at retail are cited as a cause in some few markets.
