The purchase price was \$1300 the price being low because of the slump in the sheep market, the price for such an animal ordinarily being four or five thousand dollars. The ram was bought from Bullard Bros. of California, and will be used for breeding purposes.

The ram was sheared by the Cunningham Co. and 58 pounds of wool secured. This was with stubble shearing. Samples of the wool are being sent to experts in Australia, so that estimates of the value of the wool can be made.
