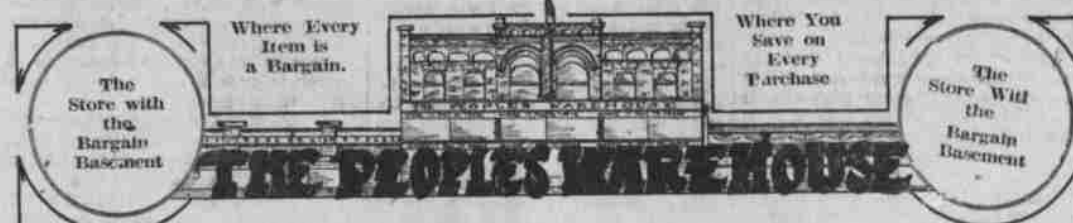

For the allied commanders predicted when we entered that it would last five years longer. Preparations made in accordance with this prediction called for vast outlays of money. And the very preparations which we made

as well as the speed with which we brought our forces into action broke down the morale of the enemy, shattered the war and lessened the cost in life that had to be paid for victory.

In a "Partisan Fog"

The trade against Cox, the league candidate, which appeared on the front page of yesterday's Tribune over Judge Lowell's name originated in the fog of partisan bias. To accuse and traduce Governor Cox is to attack the character of the great army of progressive republicans of Ohio.

Harding a Reactionary

The allegation in that same article

that Cox is wet without mention of Harding's wet record, and the charge that Cox is wealthy without admitting that Harding was the choice of the reactionaries and those of extreme fortune are further proofs of partisan blindness.

Lowell Is Confused

When Judge Lowell suggests that we go into some sort of association (rather than the League he displays further confusion. For Article 20 obligates the nations already in the League to reject membership in any other League. Before Harding could take us into his new League, he must first destroy the existing League; which forty-three nations have already entered.

Peace or War

Whether we shall accept our vacant seat at the head of the League, or whether we shall join with the enemies of peace for the destruction of the League is the question to be voted on tomorrow and upon our decision thus to be made the fate of civilization may rest.

A vote for Cox is a vote for the League while a vote for Harding would seem to be a vote for its destruction and a return to militarism.
