## GERMAN TRADES GO EAST

TOKIO, Nov. 1.—(A. P.)—With restoration of peace, there are growing signs of activity of German traders in the Far East, says the newspaper Yomato. The German business men are arriving here in numbers, the latest arrivals numbering about sixty, the paper said. These Germans are chiefly the representatives of German importing houses and already have contracted for purchases of a large quantity of canned foods and various other provisions.
