Business on Stock Exchange
Irregular and Contracted
NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Business on the stock market was irregular in movement and contracted in volume, as was to be expected, in view of the holiday in London and today's suspension of operations in all the markets of this country.

Events over the week end presented no change from recent conflicting conditions. The stronger returns of the local federal and clearing house banks were offset by advices emphasizing further reactionary tendencies in trade and commerce. From western points came reports of greater conservatism on the part of producers based on the hesitant attitude of consumers and decrease of railway tonnage from that of the corresponding period of last year. Further private price cutting was reported by steel manufacturers and operations were announced for copper, lead and zinc.

The money market manifested no perceptible ease, although large sums were released for November interest and dividend payments. Call loans ruled at 5 per cent until the first half hour when the rate advanced to ten per cent.

Halls of the better class, notably Southern Pacific with net gain of 1.4 points, also oils and coppers, featured the firmer side of the market while shipping, textiles, rubbers and paper specialties yielded to pressure resulting from unsettled markets. Crucible steel and United Fruit were heavy most of the session on adverse dividend rumors but both are allied in the later dealings, declaration of a stock dividend of 100 per cent for fruit causing short covering throughout the general list. Sales 559,000 shares.

In the bond market prices were upward, all the liberty issues with one exception strengthening.

Canadian Crop Estimate Shows Heavy Export Yield

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 2.—An estimate on the Canadian crops for 1920 issued Monday by the Dominion Bureau of statistics showed that Canada should have 1,000,000 bushels of wheat for export in excess of last year. All other grains showed big increases over the crop of the preceding year.

The bureau's estimate of the wheat crop is 252,361,000 bushels against 192,260,000 bushels last year. This is some 4,000,000 bushels larger than the estimate two months ago.

The bureau's estimate of other field crops follows: Oats, 548,000,000 bushels against 524,000,000 bushels last year; Barley, 65,000,000 bushels against 56,000,000 last year.
