HUGE OIL STATION IS GOING UP AT TAHITI

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Nov. 2.—(A. P.)—Work has been started by the French government on construction of a huge oil station on Tahiti, the largest of the Society Islands, according to reports received here. The station will supply oil to ships in trans-Pacific service.

Lines journeying between San Francisco and Vancouver, on the American continent, and New Zealand and Australian ports are expected to make regular calls at the Tahiti station for oil. Boats on the run from Australia to New York, and Europe via the Panama canal also will be served.

Three large tanks capable of storing thousands of barrels of oil are being constructed.

TOKIO POULTRY RAISERS PLAN BIG MASS TO HONOR SOULS OF SLAIN FOWL

TOKIO, Nov. 2.—A poultry dealer's business requires the slaying of countless fowl, but those of Japan kill them with tender regret for the spiritual welfare of their feathered victims.

This is shown by the fact that Tokio poultry merchants are making preparations for a gigantic ceremony at which a general mass will be said in order to convey comfort to the spirits of the chickens and other feathered creatures slain during the past year. The event will be attended by 200 dealers and 500 of their employees.

"Those living things have life as much as we do," explained one of the merchants. "Therefore it is proper that we comfort their spirits."

SEATTLE SCHOONER ESCAPES CAPTIVITY IN NORTH ICE JAM

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 1.—(A. P.)—By about twenty four hours the Seattle trading schooner Kamchatka recently escaped being sealed in the Arctic Ocean ice for the winter, according to officers of the boat which has arrived here from the far north.

On September 23 the Kamchatka sailed through Bearing Straits, the only channel between the Arctic Ocean and Bering Sea. On September 24, the following day, the ice closed in and sealed the straits until next June or July.

The Kamchatka has been hunting walrus to the east of the straits when a fierce storm began blowing from the northeast, driving the ice toward the straits. The boat stopped hunting and headed for the passage, reaching there in time to find a narrow lane open between ice that extended out from the shores.

FRANK JAY GOULD ERECTS CHURCH IN HONOR OF PARENTS

PARIS, Nov. 2.—(A. P.)—The Gould Memorial Church of the Holy Trinity at Malsons-Laffite, the gift of Frank Jay Gould and erected in memory of his parents, has just been dedicated and given into the care of the American and British colonies there.

The church stands on a knoll near a public park. It is of white stone, simple in design. The scheme of interior decoration, yet incomplete, comprises a large curved fresco, "The Ascension," at one end where it will be under strong light.

It is at Malsons-Laffite, just outside of Paris that Mr. Gould has a home and his stable.
