VOTE FOR HARTMAN IS 1680; OPPONENT'S 755

George A. Hartman polled 1680 votes to 755 for A. W. Rugg in the Pendleton mayoralty race, complete returns from the 13 city precincts today showed. Every precinct in the city returned a majority for Mr. Hartman.

The mayor elect carried his own precinct, No. 43, by the big margin of 231 to 74, or three to one. In Mr. Rugg's precinct, No. 44, on the north side, he ran the closest race, the vote standing 135 for Mr. Hartman to 115 for Mr. Rugg. The result by precincts were as follows:

under the late sheriff, accompanied him.

Local Men to Attend.
Among those who left on various trains today for Salem were F. S. Le Grow, of Athena, long a friend of the Taylor family; N. D. Swearingen, brother-in-law of the late sheriff; Glenn Bushaw, deputy sheriff; Will M. Peterson and Elmer Moore, Carl Perfinger, who is in Portland, has an invitation to the hanging and will attend. George Strand, a former deputy under Sheriff Taylor, was invited, as was J. C. Marsh, who was deputy on duty the day of the jail break.

Hart's accomplices in the jail break, two of whom were convicted after a jury trial of first degree murder, were sentenced to hang four weeks from tomorrow, on December 3. The appeal taken for those two, Elvie D. Kerby and John L. Rathie, however, resulted in a stay of execution, and their death sentences may or may not be commuted, as the supreme court decides.

Hart is ready to go to his death trap tomorrow a repentant man, say reports from Salem. Since his arrest and conviction on the charge of murder he has accepted spiritual guidance with more faith than his four comrades and he has frequently been visited by ministers of the gospel and by members of the Salvation Army. It was Miss Jennie Conrad, captain of the Salvation Army post here, who first carried the word to Hart and she also got in touch with his father to tell him of his son's fate.

OPIMUM SMUGGLING TO PHILIPPINES ALARMS

MANILA, P. I., Nov. 4.—(A. P.)—Opium smuggling into the Philippine Islands from China, Japan and British North Borneo, has grown to such proportions that customs officials of the Philippine government have become alarmed. During the last six months secret service agents have seized opium valued at approximately \$200,000 and they say this is only a small portion of the drug which has been brought into the islands illegally at the ports of Manila, Iloilo, Cebu, Zamboanga and Jolo.

Secret service operatives declare they are unable to stop the illegal traffic in opium, morphine and other drugs with present facilities at their disposal. A submarine chaser built for the United States government during the war was recently brought here on board a transport and turned over to the Philippine government. It is the intention of the customs service to use the speedy craft in patrolling the coast of the island off Luzon northward from Manila bay, as soon as the legislature provides money for its operation.

Nearly every vessel arriving from China and Japan is closely watched by customs officials. A tug is kept in service constantly to meet these ships off Corridor Island, at the entrance to Manila Bay, in order to prevent the smugglers from throwing overboard their contraband goods, which can be easily picked up by small craft and transported to the mainland.

While Manila is the most important port at which to carry on the illegal traffic, the vigilance of the officials here has driven many of the smugglers to the southern islands where comparatively little difficulty is experienced in landing the drug. Only a single coast guard cutter, the "Mindoro," patrols the entire group of islands from Sorsogon to British North Borneo from which island the traffic largely originates.

Numerous vintas, small sailing craft, take shelter in the bay and rivers along the North Borneo coast, out of reach of the coast guard cutter, and can not operate within the three mile limit. When a favorable wind comes and the "Mindoro" is out of sight, the vintas with their opium of board, set sail for Jolo or the island of Tawitawi where they land the drug without detection.

PROGRESSIVE INDIANS WILL LEARN FISHERY

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 4.—(A. P.)—Progressive Indians of southeastern Alaska want to learn the white man's methods of fishery, according to Marius T. Hansome, of the United States bureau of education at Hyaburg, Alaska. Mr. Hansome is completing arrangements to enroll a number of Hyaburg Indians in the College of Fisheries at the University of Washington and at private schools. A number also will be placed in industrial plants near here as a means of gaining practical knowledge.

Mr. Hansome says citizens of the village of Hyaburg have twenty-five boats worth about \$5,000 each, and to operate and repair these boats the mechanically inclined native boys are coming here to learn modern methods of repair, welding and construction.

The Hyaburg Indians are among the most progressive Indians in Alaska. The student body of the government school publish their own newspaper as well as arrange lectures in English on science and business practice. The natives boast of a co-operative store and sawmill. Hyaburg soon will have a co-operative cannery and an electric light plant.

CALIFORNIA JAPANESE TO ARGUE AS CITIZENS

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—(U. P.)—Japanese here today announced their intention of starting a court action to enjoin the state against placing in effect the anti-Japanese program which was passed by the voters of California Tuesday. It is understood here that the Japanese hope eventually to establish through the courts that they are eligible for citizenship and that the anti-alien law does not apply to them. The law as written does not mention Japanese, merely specifying that persons not eligible to citizenship cannot hold land.
