UNIQUE BENEFIT SCHEDULED.
To assist in the financing of the Hawthorne school boys' band, a trip around the world is being planned for Friday evening. Teachers and parents are assisting with the event which promises to be an affair elaborately worked out and charmingly presented. Thirty boys from the personnel of the band and a sum of \$1,800 has been put into the musical instruments. Those suitable for solo work are being purchased by the members themselves, but the big horns, drums, etc., are being provided by the school, the drums being used also by the institution. The band master's salary is also to be met. Last year when papers were collected and shipped by the schools, Hawthorne pupils earned \$155 which has been applied to the band fund.

Seven planes are listed in the interesting itinerary—California, Alaska, Japan, Boston, New Orleans, Holland and back to old New York. Mrs. Gertrude Nash, principal of the Hawthorne school, is leading in the organization of the event with efforts of the parents and teachers also directed toward its success. A faculty member is to assist at each destination, where a continuous program will be in progress. The tour will occupy about three hours and under the names of famous entertainers, the foremost talent of Pendleton will assist.

In Friday evening's event many sports will be visited, passengers leaving the O.W. H. & N. depot "dock" in any one of nearly half a hundred gasoline-run "steamers" which may be chosen, as the porters call out the

hours of embarkation, by the name of one's favorite Round-Up horse. The voyage aboard even "Long Tom," however, promises to be somewhat more smooth sailing.

Road Will Be Built.
S. R. Woods, forest ranger who is located at Gardane, is in the Umatilla forest office today. He will go later to the Bingham springs region where forest rangers will assist in building a road. Seven or eight rangers will do the work which consists largely of repairing and improving the old Thomas Ruckle Road. The road building done under the supervision of the forestry service will not be extensive but will help toward making a highway across the summit into the Grande Ronde valley.

State Chamber Men Here.
Two representatives of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce are in Pendleton today in the interest of that body's state-wide drive to raise \$100,000 annually for the next three years for an intensive advertising campaign for all of Oregon. NEW CLUBS IMMINENT WITH BASEBALL WAR

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—(U. P.)—Following a conference with other "loyal" American League magnates here today, Clark Griffith, owner of the American League Washington club, said that in case there is a baseball war and a new organization of 12 clubs is formed, the American League will start three new clubs. He said they would be placed in Chicago, Boston and New York, where American League clubs which have favored reorganizations are located. He said that promoters for the three new clubs are already obtained and sufficient money is in sight to insure their success.

POOR GUESSES SHOWED ON SATURDAY'S GAMES

Predictions as to the outcome of Saturday's football games in the northwest conferences did not run very true to form, with California a 49 to 6 winner over the Washington State College team, Stanford a bare 3 to 9 winner over University of Washington and Whitman victor over University of Montana, 13 to 7. Of these games, the Stanford-Washington contest came nearest to running true to advance prophecies.

The rout of the Cougars at the hands of the Bears caused more than mere comment here. The score aroused consternation. Seven touchdowns over the northwest's best team indicated that California has one of the greatest machines in the recent history of coast football and stamped the Bears as fit to meet the best of the east at Pasadena on New Year's day should they emerge winner over Stanford two weeks hence.

Stanford and California, by their wins Saturday, took the argument to the golden state for the conference

honors and the right to enter the New Year's day east-west contest. Oregon and Washington universities bowed to Stanford; Oregon Agricultural College and Washington State College lost to California. The teams which were conquered by Stanford meet at Eugene on Saturday—the California victims meet on the same day at Pullman.

At Walla Walla a lot of Pendleton fans were treated to a sweet, football game Saturday when the Missionaries defeated the University of Montana 13 to 7. Whitman scored in the first quarter when Tilton made 15 yards on a criss cross after a Montana punt had been blocked. Montana tied up the score in the third quarter after a series of long off tackle runs by Left Hult Sullivan, star of their backfield. Both goals were converted.

Whitman failed with a field goal in this quarter but in the final period after gaining and losing the oval worked it to the danger zone. Two passes were completed, the first from Garver to Comrada and the second Garver to Tilton. On the next play, which lined up for a pass, Tilton criss crossed, took the ball from the passer's hands and skirted Montana's right end for the touchdown. Goal kick failed, the ball hitting the bar.

It was the first Whitman football victory for so long that the students nearly wore out the memorial bell tolling the good news. Montana did not have the strength that gave them an 18 to 14 win over the University of Washington one week after Washington had trimmed Whitman 35 to 14. The day was ideal and a large throng enjoyed the best game seen on the Whitman field in many a season.
