NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—(U. P.)—Reports that textile manufacturers contemplate a general wage reduction as a step toward lowering prices were received today by John Golden, international president of the United States Workers of America with the declaration: "We will fight." He declared that the first persons who must accept a reduction in "wages" are the stockholders. Next come the extremely high paid executives. When all this is done it will be found that there is no reason for reducing the wages of the textile workers."
