EXECUTION CERTIFICATE RECEIVED FROM SALEM

The certificate of execution for Emmett Bancroft, alias Neil Hart, hanged at Salem Friday for the murder of Sheriff Th Taylor, was received today by County Clerk R. E. Brown from Warden L. H. Conpton, of the Oregon State Prison. The document was attached to the death warrant signed by Circuit Judge G. W. Phelps following Hart's sentence to death in September.

Besides the certificate of hanging, there was attached the signatures of 12 citizens who witnessed the execution. They certified that they saw the execution and that Hart was dead following the hanging.
