MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 10.—(A. P.)—Results of the recent election are construed as a "remarkable gain" for the national Non-Partisan League in a statement to the Associated Press by Oliver S. Morris, director of league publicity. "The league candidates polled more than 2,000,000 votes in 1920 in nine states," he said. "This is more than three times the vote of two years ago and is a remarkable gain in the republican landslide year."

### GERMAN PRESIDENT GETS SCANT SHOW AT COUNTER WHERE SANDWICHES SELL

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—(A. P.)—The charge which has taken place in the attitude of Germans toward official personages was illustrated the other day at Templehof Field where the German emperor formerly twice a year reviewed the troops of the Berlin garrison. President Ebert visited the field a few days ago to watch the filming of a motion picture but instead of the adulation which used to be accorded to the Emperor, the

crowd of 4,000 costumed performers failed to recognize the President, jostled him and gave him scant show at the sandwich counter. The German President wandered about unaccompanied and stood for a while beside the camera man while a scene was photographed. Later he made his way against the edge of a crowd witnessing a "riot scene." When the crowd was ordered out of camera range, Herr Ebert received no consideration from the jostling spectators. One of the crowd who recognized him called attention to his presence but few gave him notice.
