GENERAL WRANGLER IS DRIVEN FROM SEBASTOPOL WHEN REDS CROSS ICE, SEIZING PENINSULA

Anti-Bolshevik Commander is Attacked From Rear While Forces Are Tangled in Combat With Troops on Mainland.

FEAR HELD LEST ARMY AT PEREKOP IS LOST

Huge Quantities of Munitions Are Believed Destroyed or Captured, Constantinople Ships Hurried to Scene.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 13.—According to dispatches, soviet forces have gained their entrance to the peninsula by crossing the frozen sea of Azof to the eastward of the isthmus. While General Wrangel's troops were engaged with red forces around Perekop, the bolsheviks crossed the ice and attacked them from the rear. Fear was expressed that Wrangel's forces about Perekop have been annihilated.

With the way thus opened, the reds poured into Crimea practically unopposed, only the rear guard actions being fought by Wrangel's troops to cover the reported evacuation of Sebastopol. Huge quantities of munitions are believed to have been destroyed by Wrangel or to have fallen into the hands of the bolsheviks.

City Desperately Held. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—Unconfirmed dispatches today reported that Sebastopol, the principal headquarters of General Wrangel, has been evacuated. Sebastopol is on the southwesternmost tip of the Crimean peninsula, south of Perekop, a strategic point on the isthmus. Wrangel was trying desperately to hold against the advancing bolsheviks.

Allied Fleets Hurry Aid. PARIS, Nov. 13.—The situation of General Wrangel in Crimea is extremely bad as a result of the bolshevik gaining control of the isthmus of Perekop, according to dispatches today. Allied fleets are preparing to aid evacuation of certain districts in Crimea.

British Requisition Ships. LONDON, Nov. 13.—(A. P.)—Sebastopol is being evacuated. The British are requisitioning ships in Constantinople to take refugees to that city, says a dispatch today.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—Some of the republican senatorial colleagues of President Harding today started a boom for Senator Chamberlain, of Oregon, democrat, for secretary of war in Harding's cabinet. Chamberlain was defeated and will retire from the senate on March 4. He was chairman of the senate military affairs committee during the war and is the senate is giving credit for having done more than anyone else to get the war department going effectively. He would be acceptable to Senator Wadsworth, chairman of military affairs, as war secretary. It is understood.

Harding is said to have been strongly urged by republican senators to appoint a "Simon pure" southerner to his cabinet. Senator Borah, of Idaho, one of the leaders in this movement, said he hoped Harding would pick a big man with the confidence of the south. It would be a big thing for the administration to do, irrespective of politics and would show a united country, Borah said.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—General Wrangel's communique Friday declared that all bolshevik attempts to take Perekop have failed. Soviet troops were beaten back with heavy losses, he said. Wrangel has proclaimed a state siege in Crimea.

A. or other club room for Pendleton boys was expressed last night by David Swanson and Donald Woodworth, high school boys who spoke last night at the banquet given by the Men's Forum of the Presbyterian church to 55 local youths who were honor guests of 20 Pendleton business men.

Young Swanson declared that the boys feel the need of "some place to go" and that such a place is lacking. He said that the high school boys have expressed a wish that the various men's clubs give their club room one night each week to the young men. Woodworth's talk followed Swanson's and he also made a plea for a boy's club where youths may read or play.

Dr. John Griswold, veteran physician of Helix, in a short talk urged the boys to cultivate a spirit of investigation and to cultivate early right habits of thought.

"The spirit of investigation," said Dr. Griswold, "will lead you into ways of helping your fellowman."

GEORGE HARTMAN TAKES OATH AS MAYOR-ELECT

George A. Hartman took his oath of office as mayor-elect of Pendleton at 10:30 this morning. The pledge to support the constitution and laws of the nation and state and the laws, charter and ordinances of the city was signed and sworn to before Judge Thomas Fitz-Gerald in the city recorder's office. Councilman-elect Robert Simpson and a local newspaper man were the only witnesses to the official act.

Mr. Simpson also signed his oath of office as councilman from the first ward today. Willard Bond, councilman-elect from the second ward, is out of town and has not yet signed out in ceremony at Bally McElligott. Richard Lawrence, elected to serve from the third ward, is still undecided whether he will move to Walla Walla and has not yet qualified. Marion Jack, water commissioner, and Lee Moorhouse, treasurer, also renewed their oaths Friday afternoon.

January 1 falls on a Saturday, so the mayor and councilmen will not take office officially until the first meeting is called sooner for the purpose.

Anarchy is Rampant in Yucatan and Tampico Laborers Quit Jobs to Parade Streets Crying Revolutionary Aims.

ARMS AND AMMUNITION SMUGGLED OVER BORDER

Bombing Attempted, Pitched Battles Break Out and Rioters, Entrenched in Coin, are Ready for Prolonged Siege.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—Settlement of the Vera Cruz dock workers strike was announced this afternoon by the government, causing hope the sympathetic strikers and disorders reported in various parts of the country as a result of the Vera Cruz walkout to be speedily ended and order restored throughout Mexico.

VERA CRUZ, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—A general strike called in sympathy with striking stevedores here is spreading along the entire gulf coast, according to advices received here today. Ten strikebreakers who were attempting to take the places of stevedores in progress are reported to have been killed by the strikers. The strikers tried to blow up the customs house here late yesterday. Defective mechanism of the bomb caused its failure to explode. All business houses have again been closed and troops called to preserve order. Dispatches from Yucatan where a sympathizers' strike was preceded by fighting between anarchists and federal troops, declared "anarchy is rampant" in that section.

Strikers Parade Streets
Practically all workers in Tampico quit their jobs yesterday afternoon and paraded the streets singing revolutionary songs. Owing to the collection of large funds, presumably in preparation for just such a situation, strikers everywhere are said to be in a financial position to hold out for a long period.

According to government officials a plot has been discovered for a big red demonstration to be staged the night of November 30. Arms and ammunition have been smuggled across the American border for the purpose, it was stated.

Cry for Soviet

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 13.—(By Ralph H. Turner, U. P. Staff Correspondent.)—The general strike, attended by serious disorders has been declared throughout the province of Yucatan, according to official war office dispatches today. Railway employees, dock workers and power plant operators are said to have gone out in sympathy with striking stevedores in Vera-Cruz. The situation is described as "extremely critical." Pitched battles occurred in Vera-Cruz when foreign ship companies attempted to employ strikebreakers. Strikers attacked them, carrying red flags and shouting "viva la soviet."

Farm hands in the state of Puebla are reported to have been unopposed and are prepared to join the general strike unless they receive wage increases.

JOE BENJAMIN KNOCKED OUT

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 13.—(A. P.)—Ritchie Mitchell, local lightweight boxer, knocked out Joe Benjamin of San Francisco in the ninth session of a 15 round contest last night. Mitchell floored Benjamin three times in the final round.
