Price Not Fixed.
Although the retail price for Thanksgiving turkeys has not yet been fixed, the price, as estimated by local grocers, will probably be 45 cents a pound for dressed birds. This is approximately the same price as was paid last year.

Sewer Nearly Completed.
All pipe has been laid and connected for the Turner street sewer and the crew with the exception of three men, laid off. The remaining three are finishing up the manholes on the system and by the latter part of this week will have completed the project. City Engineer Hayes said today. The connections will be ready for use by next week.

New Highway Viewed.
County Judge C. H. Marsh and Commissioner G. L. Dunning left by auto this morning to view the progress on the old Oregon Trail between Rieth and Echo. It is expected that the graveling will be completed by the end of this year. Commissioner Anderson was unable to accompany his colleagues because of an operation on his nose performed on Saturday.

Drunk Cases Number Three.
Two Indians and one white man was the toll of too much alcohol over the week end. Miss Tompkins and Mitchell Thompson, redskins, put up \$10 bail for their release on Sunday and forfeited by their non-appearance for trial this morning. Henry Mitchell, white, was unable to pay the fine of \$10 assessed against him for being drunk and started to serve out his five days' sentence.

Twenty-six Hats Made.
Twenty-six winter hats were made at the three day millinery school held recently in Umatilla under the direction of Mrs. Edith G. Van Deusen, home demonstration agent. Mrs. Van Deusen says that the hats are attractive and fashionable, although no extreme or intricate models were attempted. New hats were made and old hats remodelled. The school will be repeated in the spring.

No New Mails Schedule.
The local postoffice had received no new mail schedule despite the change in time schedule of trains, says Lester Cronin, local postmaster. No. 6, which now carries only mail and express, arrives at 4:40 a. m. but Mr. Cronin says that he has not been notified that there is a clerk on the train. No. 5, however, brings eastern mail at 1:15 a. m. and has a clerk. No. 24, which runs on No. 6's old time, brings the Portland mail.

County Men Appointed.
Three Umatilla county men have been appointed members of standing committees of the grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias to serve during the ensuing year and at the next annual convention of the grand lodge in Portland next October. Those who were appointed are W. W. Wassner, of Milton, masonry and per diem committee; William Purchase of Pendleton, committee on rules; and J. T. Hinkle, of Hermiston, necrology committee.

Delinquencies Quickly Checked.
"An example of the efficiency of the new system of accounting recently installed in the city water department offices was given this month when delinquent notices were available for mailing on the eleventh, just a day after the grace period expires. Several delinquents who received notices and failed to respond were later cut off and penalized \$1. Under the old system it was the fifteenth or later before delinquencies could be checked up and nearly the end of the month before shutoffs could be made. As a result, collections are improving in the water office, the force reports.


Golf Tournament Not Held.
