Export Buying Puts Up.

Price of Wheat Monday.
CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—Material upturn in the price of wheat took place Monday with much of the buying ascribed to export houses. Bolshevik success in southern Russia was construed as a bullish factor. The market closed firm, 3-4 to 5-1-2 net higher with December 1.83 3-4 to 1.84 1-4 and March 1.75 1-4 to 1.75 3-4. Corn finished unchanged to 3-4 higher; oats up 1-8@3-8 and provisions unchanged to an advance of 9c.

Developments regarding grain attract a more attention in wheat pits than did news about unfavorable aspects of the general business situation. Scarcities of receipts here together with avidity multiplying that farmers were refusing to sell counted also as a handicap on the bears.
Selling pressure on corn and oats forced them to the lowest prices yet this season but wheat strength brought about rallies.

Firmness in provisions was largely the result of higher quotations on hogs.

Coffee Futures Open Lower

and Rally to Net Gain.
NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—(A. P.)—The market for coffee futures opened at a decline of 1 to 7 points under further scattered liquidation. The pressure was much less active, fol-

lowing the declines of last week, however, and prices firmed up later on covering accompanied by reports of a firmer tone in cost and freight offer a March rallied from 7.50 to 7.80; with more active months selling 21 to 23 points net higher during the middle of the afternoon. There were reactions of a few points later under realizing with March advance of 16 to 21 points December 7.00; Jan. 7.23; March 7.68; May 7.89; July 8.20; Sept. 8.50. Spot coffee quiet; Rio 7s 7 3-8; Santos is 10 3-4@11 1-2.
