Commissioners Like Road.
The county commissioners yesterday drove over the Old Oregon Train to Echo and returned pleased with the progress of it. Three and a half miles of ungraveled road remains, this being divided into three stretches. County Judge Marsh estimated that another month of favorable weather will see this work completed.

New Building Occupied
The new boys' dormitory at St. Joseph's Academy is now occupied. The building accommodates 50 boys and 42 have already taken quarters in the dormitory. The building, built at a cost of \$9,000 by P. A. Ballargeon, architect and builder of Seattle, is complete for the final work on the front porch.

Dodge Session Friday.

Convention to Be Held.
The annual convention of the State Wool Growers' Association will be held here some time in January, says Mac Hoke, secretary of the association. No definite date has been set but the meeting will probably be on January 19. Jay Dobbys, president of the association, and Mr. Hoke will make the arrangements. One of the important matters to be discussed is the tariff on wool and special speakers will be here for the occasion.

Association to Renew Lease
The Pendleton Commercial Association today received notice from W. Bolony, superintendent of the second division of the O. W. R. & N. Co., at La Grande, that he had recommended to headquarters the extension for five years of the old Happy Canyon site at Main and Railroad streets, to the association. The lease is to expire on December 21 but the association desires the use of the property in the future and recently applied for a renewal, as specified in the present contract. The railroad owns the ground but has no buildings or tracks on it.

Librarians Invited Here
The Pendleton Commercial Association today sent to Miss Sabra Nason, county librarian, a letter assuring her that it would cooperate with her efforts to bring the next annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest Library Association to this city during the first three days of Round-Up week in 1921. Miss Nason has been desirous of having the association meet here and the endorsement of the Commercial Association was desired. The directors, however, assured her that at that time of year they, as a body, would have little opportunity to provide special entertainment for the visitors.

Chart Shows Slump in Wheat
The daily course of the Chicago wheat market since its opening July 15 is being graphed by the Interior Warehouse Agency here. The chart shows that never since the opening day has wheat stood so high. March wheat on the first day closed at \$2.75 and yesterday, November 15, four months later, it closed at \$1.75 1/2, a loss of \$1.02 1/2. December wheat was \$2.75 on July 15 and \$1.84 yesterday, a loss of 91 cents. The last March high point was August 12, when it closed at \$2.47. On September 13 wheat hit a high point of \$2.40 but on Oct. 15 rallied after a steady loss to \$2.17 1/2. Since that date it has consistently dropped with one or two exceptions.

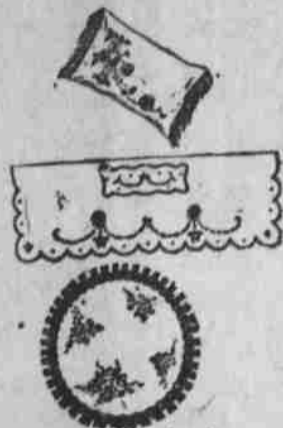
Hampton is Cadet Officer

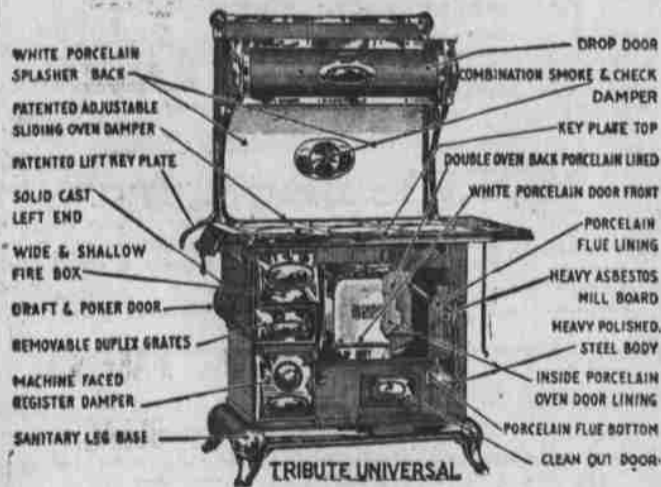
