## COUNCIL TO ACT ON TAX LEVY ORDINANCE

An ordinance fixing the tax levy in Pendleton for 1921 expenses at 11 mills will be presented to the city council today for adoption. The ordinance was prepared today by City Attorney James A. Fee, following recommendations by the city recorder and finance committee of the council. The total amount which the city desires to raise for its 1921 operating expenses is \$73,122.60. This represents about \$1500 for incidental expenses above the estimates of the various departments. The amount to be raised represents only about 2-1/2 per cent increase over the 1920 budget. Last year the full 5 per cent increase allowed by law was utilized.

The budget for 1920 was raised on a 12 mill levy but the higher valuations of city property make it possible to do business on 11 mills for 1921.

## AMERICAN VESSELS ARE RUSHED TO BLACK SEA

P.)—Vice Admiral Huse at London reported to the navy department that he was sending all available American naval vessels to the Black Sea to evacuate Americans from the Crimean area. He also said he had ordered the cruisers Chattanooga and Olympia, the fuel ship Jason, the Ramapo and all destroyers in the Mediterranean to report to Read Admiral Andrews at Constantinople.

## THREE STEAL RIDE; TRAIN KILLS ONE, HURTS TWO

VISALIA, Calif., Nov. 17.—(A. P.)—Timothy Vines, 22, said by the authorities to be a resident of Bakersfield, was instantly killed yesterday when he was knocked from a Southern Pacific freight train on which he was stealing a ride, according to the train crew. His companions, George Stewart of Portland, Oregon, and M. Roscoe, address unknown, were badly injured. The men were thrown from a box car when it was shunted into another car to which it was to be coupled. Vines was thrown under the wheels.

## STORM SIGNALS ARE PUT UP ALONG COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17.—(A. P.)—Storm signals were ordered up tonight along the coast between Point Reyes and Cape Horn, according to the United States weather bureau here. A southwest gale is expected, according to Forecaster E. A. Beale. Storm signals on Puget Sound will continue up, he said, for the present storm extends from Cape Flattery, Wash., to Dutch Harbor, Alaska.

## MINISTER, DENIED DIVORCE IS TOLD TO LEAVE PULPIT

CLEVELAND, Nov. 17.—(A. P.)—It is extreme cruelty for a minister to remain in his pulpit at \$93 a month when he has a wife and five children to support, Common Pleas Judge F. C. Phillips declared in an opinion handed down in a divorce suit filed by Rev. B. A. Sherwin against his wife yesterday.

"I consider it extreme cruelty for a man with a wife and five children to remain at his job, even though it be that of a minister, which pays only \$93 a month. An able-bodied man such as you are should have taken up some other profession," Judge Phillips declared. Sherwin now has obtained employment as a machinist.

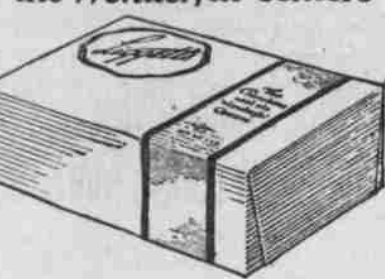
