## Trains From West Delayed

## Weather Equable Today

Only three degrees variance from minimum to maximum was the temperature record today, according to Major Lee Moorhouse's official weather observations. ## Bids for Bonds Asked

The city recorder today advertised for bids for the sale of the city's recently authorized bond issues. One series is for \$14,000 for the purchase of fire apparatus and the other for \$8000 for the purchase of a block for park and playground purposes. The bonds are 10 year, 6 per cent securities, redeemable on option after five years. Five per cent of the bid must be sent by certified check with each proposal. The bids will be opened December 1.

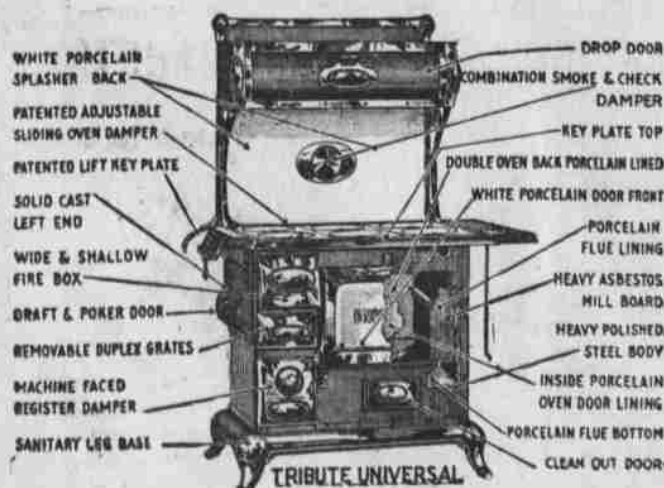
