COAST CHAMPIONSHIP AND STATE FOOTBALL TITLES UP SATURDAY

California and Stanford Are Contenders for Conference Honors While Oregon and Aggies Will Have Annual Game.

- Games of November 20. At Corvallis—Oregon vs. Oregon Aggies. At Berkeley—Stanford vs. California. At Los Angeles—Pomona vs. Occidental. At Missoula—Idaho vs. Montana. At Butte—Gonzaga vs. Montana Mines. At Boulder—Colorado Aggies vs. Colorado U.

Four great institutions in two great states tomorrow will pit their football teams in battle to determine which is supreme in their respective commonwealths.

Not alone the football championships of Oregon and California, but the leadership of the Pacific Coast conference will be settled tomorrow afternoon. The game between University of California and Stanford University, at Berkeley, is the coast title event; that between Oregon and Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis is the continuation of the time honored rivalry between those two institutions.

Washington Teams Meet. Washington State College and the University of Washington do not meet tomorrow to settle the supremacy in Washington. From results this season it is not necessary for these eleven to meet. The state university has made a sorry showing this far.

One of the greatest crowds in the history of coast football will attend the championship contest at Berkeley. Thousands will be turned away because the stadium will hold only 25,000 persons. Nearly all seats have been allotted to students and alumni of the two golden state colleges. No outsiders will have a chance to watch

the battle between the two neighboring colleges.

A resume of performances for the present season makes it look like a California year. The Bears, under Coach Andy Smith, have delivered decisive blows to every team met excepting the Oregon Aggies, and they sent the Ags down to defeat by a 19-point margin at Corvallis. The 19-0 rout of Washington State College was the biggest surprise sprung by the Bears.

Stanford Is Tough. Stanford is reputed to have a sturdy bunch of football men and may give California an awful scare. The fight to represent the west in the annual east vs. west football game at the Pasadena Tournament of Roses on January 1 goes with tomorrow's victory and both teams will want that honor.

Nothing more than the state supremacy hinges upon the outcome of the annual homecoming contest between O. A. C. and Oregon. The Aggies have won once and lost twice to coast conference teams this season while Oregon has broken even in its two conference contests. A win for the Aggies, however, would put them ahead of the Eugene aggregation in the final standings.

It has been several seasons since the Aggies have taken the measure at the University and from indications they will not turn the trick this year. The orange and black started the season auspiciously, but after the first couple of games they slumped down and last Saturday took a 28-0 trimming from the Washington State College eleven.

Huntington Has Good Crew. While the Aggies have been showing less class as the season advanced, the Pioneers have gained in strength and will be at their best tomorrow. In the recent game with University of Washington the Huntington men played real football all through and Bill Steers put up one of the best games in his career. The whole Oregon team is showing good teamwork and Ely Huntington has some able substitutes, as was shown by the work of Meade, Chapman and Strachan in the lineup Saturday.

University of Washington and Washington State College will not be playing tomorrow. The Sun Dodgers are getting in line to receive the Dartmouth college eleven a week from Saturday and will dedicate the coast's largest stadium on the University of Washington campus for that game. The Washington State eleven will be on its way to Lincoln, Nebraska, where it will meet the Cornhusker team on Thanksgiving day.

LUCKY SIDE OF FIELD IS ASSIGNED TO SHY'S MEN FOR U. S. C. GAME

Oregon Believes That Bench on West Side of Pasadena Grid-iron Insures Victory and Team Will Sit There Again.

The University of Oregon football team has been granted a concession for the Thanksgiving Day game against the University of Southern California. It is in keeping with an old tradition of Huntington's men that the west side of the field at Pasadena in the "lucky" side and Oregon has been given that side for the forthcoming contest.

According to the dope, Oregon kept its wonder team of 1918 on the west side of the Tournament of Roses park and trimmed the University of Pennsylvania eleven. Last year when Harvard barely won over the Pioneers, the eastern eleven had the place of honor. Marion McClain, graduate manager at Oregon, recently wired Henry Bruce, graduate manager at U. S. C., to be allowed to hold forth in the charmed spot. Bruce has acquiesced.

Will Settle Aspirations. The battle between the Los Angeles institution and Oregon next Thursday will be more than a mere Thanksgiving day contest. Although the U. S. C. is not a member of the Pacific Coast conference, it has put out strong American style football teams for the past several seasons and this year the Angelinos have a well grounded idea that they should be considered when the Pasadena folk pick a western eleven to meet the best of the east.

U. S. C. handed a trimming to the strong Stanford team early in the season and otherwise has gone through a fairly heavy schedule without much difficulty. The southern boys are anxious to get a whack at Andy Smith's University of California team, especially if the Bears win from Stanford tomorrow in their game for the coast conference championship. From present indications the honor of representing the west is certain to be delegated to Smith's team.

But Oregon comes in there. Stanford defeated Ely's boys 19 to 8 when they met a few weeks back at Palo Alto. Overconfidence was one of the big reasons for the defeat. Since that trimming the Eugene lads have come to the fore with a rush and scored 17 points against a much stronger Washington team that was defeated by Stanford by the bare margin of 3 to 0. So, figuring it out as one pleases, Oregon is due to come pretty near taking the Los Angeles boys down the line to a trimming Thursday, five or no five.

Show Best at Pasadena. On no field up and down the coast have Oregon teams played a better brand of football than on the Pasadena gridiron. Thursday will mark their third important appearance there since 1916 and they will go into the game with a wonderful lot of support, owing to their showing last New Year's day against Harvard. The popularity of Huntington and his men in Southern California was evidenced by a large influx of freshmen this fall from San Diego, Pasadena and other Southern California cities when the doors swung open at Eugene.

An Oregon victory Thursday would eliminate the U. S. C. boys' talk of right to be the chosen team for the east vs. west battle. If Oregon does not conquer and California takes Stanford tomorrow, it is highly probable that a long wall will go up from the southern city until a post-season game with the Bears is decided. Except for the one defeat at the hands of Stanford the University of

THOUSANDS CANNOT BE ADMITTED TO BIG GAME. STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Nov. 19.—(A. P.)—Stanford will have 656 tickets to the "Big Game" with the University of California on Nov. 20 at Berkeley, and the California students and alumni will receive 18,785 tickets. There were 23,238 applications from the students, alumni and faculty, of the two universities, while the capacity of the grandstands at Berkeley is 25,441. California has 2,207 applications that cannot be met, and Stanford 600. There will not be a sale of seats to the general public.

CLEVER PROGRAMS ARE ANNOUNCED FOR GAME. OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 19.—(A. P.)—Pioneers have been obtained for the O. A. C.—University of Oregon football game, according to the committee in charge. The covers will be black with a big orange "O" in the center. Pictures of every O. A. C. and U. of O. football man will appear in the homecoming souvenir. The coaching and training staffs of both institutions will be portrayed, giving the students of both the schools pictures of the men who handle the destinies of the teams. Numbers of the various players will be given, corresponding with those worn on the field, enabling visitors to pick out the different athletes. The Aggie girls plan to carry orange and black chrysanthemums made of crepe paper and attached to long sticks.

DEMPSEY WILL DEFEND TITLE ON DECEMBER 14. NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—(A. P.)—Jack Dempsey, the world heavyweight champion, will defend his title in a 15-round bout against Bill Brennan, the Chicago challenger, at Madison Square Garden here on Tuesday, December 14. This will be the first contest between the big fellows to be decided in New York state under the Wilkes law and was made possible by the action taken by the state house boxing commission during a joint meeting with the license committee. In a statement the commissioners said they had decided a point had been reached in the operation of the new boxing law where they felt justified in permitting heavyweight boxing contests.

BEAR-CARDINALS RUGBY CONTEST DATES CHOSEN. BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 19.—(A. P.)—Dates for the two California-Stanford rugby games to be played this fall have been set for November 27 and December 4.
