CRUISE OF BOAT TOLD TO ITS FORMER OFFICER

F. R. Weaver, of the local U. S. Navy recruiting office, was chief quartermaster of the U. S. S. New Mexico before coming to Pendleton and is therefore especially interested in a letter received yesterday from F. U. Ceresa, a sailor aboard the New Mexico who gives the details of the cruise.

Ceresa re-enlisted in January of this year, having served four years prior to that time in the navy and visited China, Japan, Siberia, and the Philippines.

Re-enlists at Eugene Now we will begin at the beginning, after re-enlisting at Eugene, Oregon, I was sent to the U. S. S. New Mexico, flagship of the Pacific Fleet. We finished target practice with the big guns off San Pedro and went on a cruise to the Hawaiian Islands.

After eight days steaming we arrived at Honolulu, where a large crowd of people met us on the dock. And as we moored to the dock the Hawaiian

band played for us, and our band played, in return. Meanwhile, the crew was buying pineapples and bananas over the side.

Some of us took a trip around the island of Oahu. First we visited the Paali, a famous old bluff, 1200 feet high, at the top of which there is a road. And here at one time a whole army was driven over its precipice. The next place of interest was the water running up hill, sounds funny, but it's true, the water comes down over a precipice and the wind blows it back up hill. Then we passed through 3100 acres of sugar cane and at last came to the pineapple fields, 40,000 acres of them. We finally reached the Halewala Hotel, it was too early for lunch so we took a glass bottled boat and went out to the Coral gardens. As the boat travels along you can see the different kinds of pretty colored coral and colored fish. After an hour of exploring these gar-

dens we returned to the hotel for lunch. Later in the afternoon we continued the trip through sugar-cane plantations, passed sugar mills and now and then, pineapple groves and at last arriving at Honolulu.

Leave Hawaii A few days later found us saying good-bye to everybody, it was a wonderful scene, just before the ship anchored the Royal Hawaiian Chorus came down on the deck and sang fare well to Admiral Rodman. Then the band struck up a few lively pieces and soon the ship was steaming sea-ward, the sun was just setting in the western skies, while the U. S. S. Idaho lay outside waiting for us to come out so she could take our berth. Everybody was happy, they had had just enough of Honolulu and now were off to Hilo, Hawaii, T. H. where lies the famous volcano of Kilauea which all were anxious to see. The next morning at 8:00

o'clock found us at Hilo. By 2:00 p. m. the third boat load off for the volcano had left the ship. Machine after machine pulled out loaded with sailors for the volcano. After riding three hours at an elevation of 4,000 feet we came to the extinct volcano pit, 700 feet deep, the sides of which are almost perpendicular. After peering over its side we backed away and climbed into the machine and drove on, soon passing another extinct crater about 200 feet deep and finally arrived upon the scene of "Dantes Inferno," sulphur vapor was coming out of the earth everywhere, the machine stops, the driver tells you to talk about a quarter of a mile. The smell of sulphur get stronger and stronger till at last you find yourself standing on the edge of a precipice, 200 feet deep and there is where you see "Hell" in its true nature, boiling hot splashing lava everywhere leaping into the air only to fall back and boil over again.

Pit is Large

The pit is three miles in circumference and one may descend to the inside but it is dangerous because the lava walls crumble. In spite of the hazards, many of the sailors went down in the pit and took pictures and posted post cards over the hot lava. A continuous flow of gas is pouring out of the pit day and night which also makes it quite dangerous in descending and ascending. It takes more than words to describe the lava pit, and the only way for any one to obtain
