### Ex-Soldier Enlists

Walter William Windsor, who served in the army overseas during the world war, has enlisted in the navy, signing up yesterday with P. R. Weaver, head of the local navy recruiting office. He will leave tomorrow night for Portland where he will take his final examination before being sent to Chicago Naval Training camp. He is enlisting as fireman, third class, for machinists mate.

### Donations Sent In

Helix, with \$136 collected, has but \$24 more to collect before going over the top in the Red Cross Roll Call. Rev. J. M. Cornelison, Presbyterian missionary to the Indians, has collected \$6 and will collect more next week. Mrs. H. W. Dickson, manager of the drive in district 44, has handed in \$109, partial return for her district. Mrs. Gertrude Nash, principal of Hawthorne school, reports the collection of \$10, which will be augmented later. Pendleton high school girls assisted by ex-service men, are carrying on the street drive today.

### Turkey Shoots Tomorrow

Pendleton will be host as one of the biggest Thanksgiving turkey shoots in years tomorrow when the Pendleton Food & Gun Club stages its annual event at the Collins Park traps near Mission. Several hundred birds have been chosen for prizes and shooting will be under way from 9 a. m. until all the trophies have been won. There are two traps to be used and they were tried out by a squad of shooters Wednesday evening. One of the features of the shoot will be a free lunch at noon and free transportation to the grounds for those who do not have cars. Pilot Rock and Echo will also have regional turkey shoots tomorrow and Helix is advertising one for Tuesday.

### Wednesday Bundle Day

Next Wednesday is Bundle Day and will be observed in Pendleton when clothing of all descriptions will be collected by the Red Cross. The Red Cross urges Pendleton people to look through their clothes closets and attics for old clothing that can be made over and to search scrap bags for pieces of materials that may be combined with other materials in the making of clothing. The Red Cross will call for bundles if notified at headquarters, phone 460. Calls for assistance are constantly becoming more numerous and the Red Cross is making every effort to meet the demand and to prepare for the winter months. The Red Cross suggests that the bundles be made as Thanksgiving offerings to the poor.

### Road Matters Discussed

Highways and highway traffic through Pendleton were topics of discussion yesterday afternoon at a meeting between the officers and directors of the Tri State Auto Club with city and county officials. Plans for broadening the scope of work and sphere of influence of the local organization were taken up. At present the local branch of the Tri State Auto Club is subservient in a measure of the head office at Walla Walla and expressions that the local club should be more of an active and administrative body were heard. The membership of the local club has been called to meet here with the local officers on December 15 when further plans for the extension of the club in this county and in Eastern Oregon will be taken up and an outline of activities of the local body made.

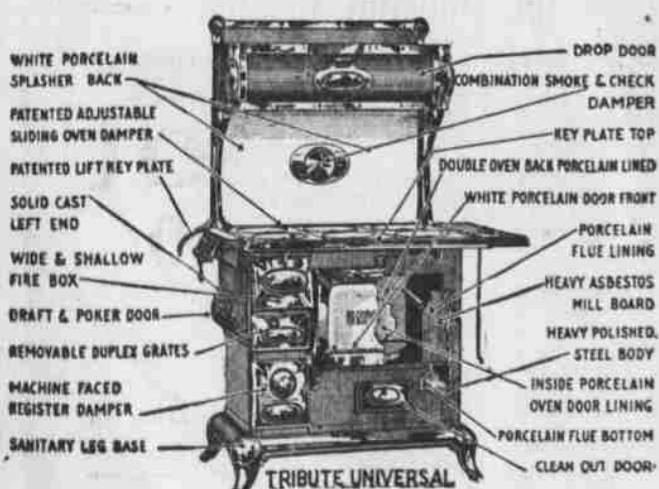

## LEWIS KEEPS WELTER TITLE WITH KNOCKOUT

LONDON, Nov. 20.—(A. P.)—"Kid" Lewis last night knocked out Johnny Basham, former welterweight cham-

ion of England, in the 19th round of a 20 round bout.

The bout was for the welterweight championship of Great Britain which Lewis wrested from Basham three months ago. It was a hard fought contest and anybody's victory up to the 18th round, when Basham, although bleeding profusely from an injured ear, was fighting gamely.

In the 18th round Lewis sent his opponent down for the count of eight

and then, when Basham arose, landed a terrific right to the point of the jaw, Basham went down and was counted out.
