WILL BENNETT IS TO SUCCEED WAILES IN BANK

State Superintendent of Banks Tenders Resignation and Will Become Vice-President of Local Financial House.

ILLNESS FORCES PRESENT CASHIER TO LEAVE CITY

Family Will Go South But Plans for Immediate Future Are Undecided; Selection of Successor Follows Study.

State Superintendent of Banks Will H. Bennett will succeed C. E. Wailes as vice-president and cashier of the Inland Empire Bank on January 1, 1921.

Mr. Bennett has arranged to purchase the stock now held by Mr. Wailes, who was one of the founders of the city's youngest financial institution.

Mr. Wailes' retirement from the local bank is voluntary and made with great regret both to himself and his associates.

Mr. Bennett is a man of experience in the banking business in Oregon and a fortunate choice.

Mr. Bennett will be a valuable addition to the community. He is a man of high character and his "missing" qualities and his enthusiasm in his work.

Entered Banking in Heppner. Starting as a bookkeeper for the First National Bank of Heppner under George Conser, cashier, on June 20, 1903.

On October 14, 1909, Mr. Bennett first joined the state banking department as a deputy. This position led to his first appointment as bank examiner on May 26, 1911.

Family to Reside Here. Since February 11, 1918, Mr. Bennett has been superintendent of banks and would have had one more year to serve after the end of this year.

Mr. and Mrs. Bennett and small son will come to Pendleton prior to the Christmas season, he said in a letter to Mr. Maloney today.

Speaking of Mr. Bennett's resignation Monday, members of the state banking board said: "The resignation of Mr. Bennett as superintendent of banks was entirely voluntary on his part and came as a great surprise to the board."

Mr. Bennett's successor has not yet been named.

TAX WILL RAISE COUNTY BUDGET FOR \$537,608

Sum Adopted for Running Expenses During 1921 is \$4,985 More Than Was Raised for Present Year Requirements.

THIS WITH SCHOOLS PUTS LEVY TO NEAR 15 MILLS

Most Items Show Increase But Total is Kept Down by Absence of Need for Money to Cover Election Expense.

A budget calling for \$537,608 for the operating expenses of Umatilla county during the year 1921 has been adopted by the county commissioners and is being published today for the first time.

While most items for the coming year show an increase, the total increase is kept down by the lack of any appropriation for elections.

Market Roads Call for Tax. Market roads tax provides for the largest increase in the new year's budget, with \$6000. This year \$49,000 was available and next year by virtue of this same tax and a higher assessed valuation, \$57,000 will be raised.

Increases in nearly all the county offices are allowed. The one decrease is in justice court which has been cut from \$1000 to \$750.

For Schools and Libraries. The Umatilla county library will receive \$2500 or \$700 more than this year. A \$2500 increase is made in the high school tuition fund.

Items which were unchanged from last year are: Sheriff's office, \$3000; County clerk's office, \$2500; County recorder's office, \$2500; County auditor's office, \$2500; County assessor's office, \$2500.

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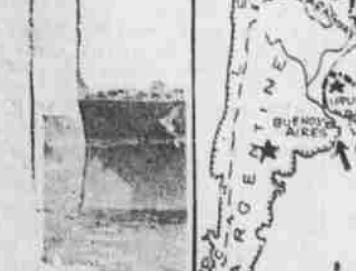
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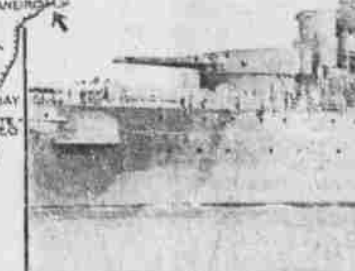
