

### STRANGLER LEWIS PUTS ZBYSZKO ON HIS BACK

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—(A. P.)—Ed Strangler Lewis of Lexington, Ky., three Wladek Zbyszko of Poland in a catch as catch can wrestling match last night with a flying headlock in 1 hour 25 minutes and 45 seconds. Lewis is thereby earned the right to meet Joe Stecher of Dodge, Neb., world's champion, who last night threw Leon O'Donnell of France in 11 minutes, 40 seconds with a body scissors and arm hold.

The Lewis-Zbyszko bout was rough, both men trying often for toeholds. In the last five minutes Lewis obtained three headlocks from two of which his opponent escaped. Lewis was in jeopardy when the Pole got a toe hold and a body hold but scrambled out and gained his feet. With the final headlock he threw Zbyszko to the floor and retaining the hold, forced the dashed Pole's shoulders to the mat.

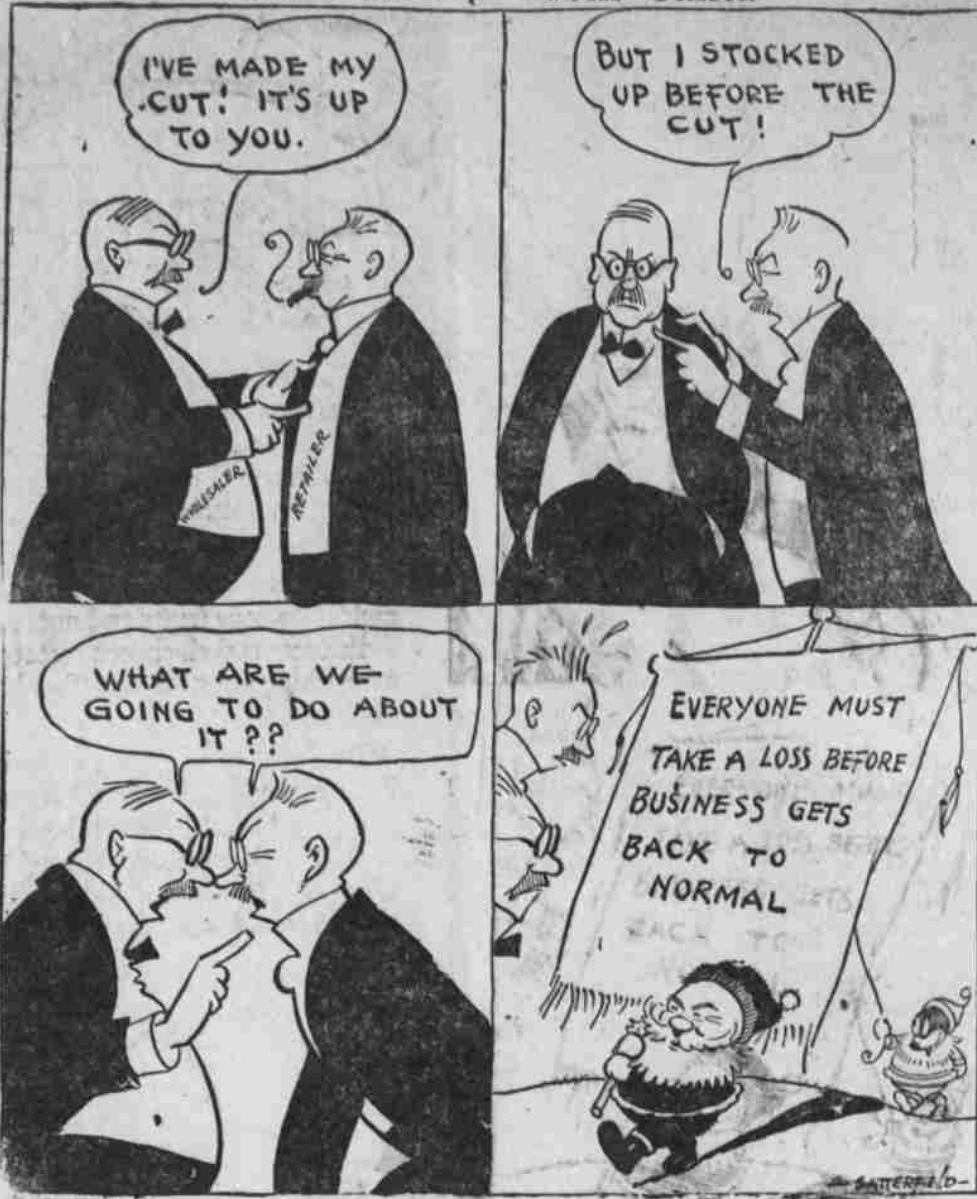
### STUDY ABROAD OFFERED TO O. A. C. GRADUATES

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 23.—An opportunity for O. A. C. graduates to obtain fellowships in French universities is offered by I. L. Kandel, national executive secretary, in a notice to the college. The fellowships have an annual value of \$2,500 and 10,000 francs, and are granted for one year with the privilege of renewal.

Fields of study which may merit an award are agriculture, botany, chemistry, economics, mathematics, physics, and others. The fellowships are offered for the purpose of encouraging advanced study and research in French universities during the coming year.

Although applicants for these fellowships are generally expected to be college graduates in a degree course, an expert who has spent five years in an industrial establishment doing work which requires technical skill, may file an application provided that he is 24 years old. LEON MINOR, one time champion Buckaroo at a Pendleton Round-Up, on Thursday was sentenced to 18 months imprisonment and a fine of \$1000 for cattle rustling at Machedo, Alberta. The specific charge was that of stealing and killing a cow and the sentence will be served in Lehighville Jail.

Cattle rustling has been going on near Happy Valley, the scene of Minor's ranch, for several years, according to an account of the case in the Calgary Herald of November 19. Provincial police have worked on the cases for a number of months and the capture is of considerable interest to stockmen in that region, the account says.

Two former employes of Minor's gave the testimony that resulted in his conviction. One of these witnesses, the story says, has recently been found guilty of cattle stealing but was freed with a suspended sentence.

### CORONER'S JURY HOLDS KILLING WAS BRAVERY

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 23.—(A. P.)—A verdict commending "the bravery and efficiency" of D. N. Parsons, a bank officer, and his wife, in killing a burglar, was returned by a coroner's jury Monday.

The shooting occurred Oct. 23. Mr. Parsons and his wife returned here late at night and discovered someone in the house. Obtaining two revolvers from his motor car, Mr. Parsons gave one to his wife, who went to the front door. Mr. Parsons stationed himself in the back yard. The intruder ran down the back steps, spied Mr. Parsons in the dim light and began shooting at him. Mr. Parsons shot and the man fell fatally wounded.

The verdict recommended "right treatment in the case for the good of the city and the safety of its citizenship."

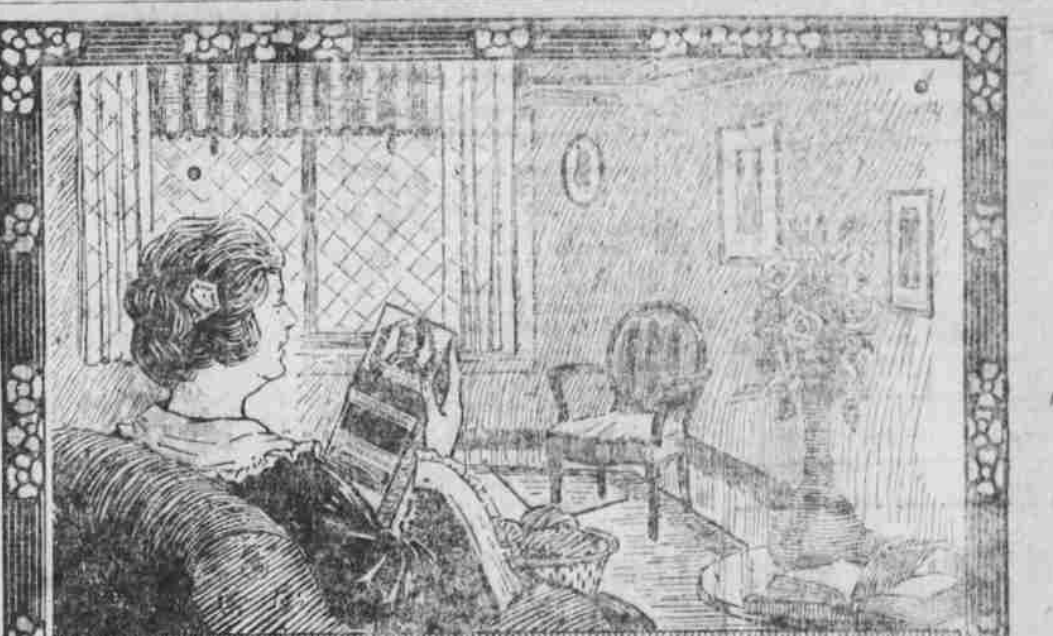
### BLONDE WOMAN AND BIG CAR SOUGHT IN MURDER

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 23.—(A. P.)—Requests for the arrest of a blonde woman driving a big red automobile were sent broadcast by the police last night in connection with the killing of Henry T. Pierce, 45, eastern manager of the Insley Manufacturing company, whose body, the head crushed with a wrench, was found in the rear of his office here. The motor car is said to have belonged to Pierce.

Pierce, who was married, had been struck over the head several times with the wrench and to make death certain, gas had been turned on the room. A gold watch and two diamond rings he was said to have worn were missing and a valuable diamond had been torn from a stickpin in his tie.

Pierce was last seen alive by persons who knew him when he entered his office late Saturday night, accompanied by a young woman who is described as "young and a blonde." The office bore evidence of a riotous "party," the police say. A number of bottles and two glasses, one half filled with whiskey, were found on a table over which the body lay.
