## CONDUCTOR LOSES LEG IN CRASH NEAR SALEM

SALEM, Nov. 24.—(A. P.)—A. F. Strange, a conductor, lost his leg and Engineer H. L. Parker, Fireman W. E. McIvor and brakeman W. S. Smith were injured today when a Southern Pacific freight crashed into the ear end of a local freight at Clatskanie early this morning. Seven demolished cars blocked the tracks and trains were detained via Silverton.

## Injury May Be Fatal

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 24.—(U. P.)—Conductor A. F. Strange and Fireman W. McIvor were perhaps fatally injured early today when two Southern Pacific freight trains collided five miles east of here. The collision was due to a dense fog as result of which one train ran just a hairman and crashed into the rear end of the other train. Seven cars were demolished. Two other trainmen were slightly injured.

A hobo, who was stealing a ride on the freight was also injured. All of the others hurt were riding in the cab at the time of the crash.

## LITTLE BENEFIT FOR CONSUMER IN SLUMP

CHICAGO, Nov. 24.—(U. P.)—Consumers will benefit only slightly as a result of the present sensational declines in livestock quotations, research departments of the Chicago packers today predicted, while admitting that drops from \$23 to \$19.50 for hogs and similar reductions in the cattle markets in less than a year, theoretically indicate great cuts in dressed pork and beef prices, these economists believe that the public will benefit only little, because retail dealers are reluctant to make reductions.

A month is required for cattle and hogs to wend their way through the preparation process to the consumer's table. However, retail prices already have started downward here.

**Cattle Market Steady.**  
PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—(A. P.)—Cattle are steady. Hogs are lower at \$11.75. Sheep are lower at \$8.50 to \$9.50. Butter and eggs are steady today.
