## NEWS OF THE COUNTY OFFICES AND OFFICERS

### Bond for McGee Placed.

H. M. McGee, charged with robbery and hold-up was given a preliminary hearing Monday afternoon in justice court here and his bond put at \$500. He was unable to give bond and was returned to jail to await the action of the grand jury on his case.

### In-Pan Held for Auto Theft.

George Whiz, who was arrested Friday night by the police on a charge of driving an auto while intoxicated, is in the county jail on request of the sheriff at Yakima that he be held. Whiz, who was booked as Willy Dick, is alleged to have stolen the car in which he was riding, from a party at Toppenish, Wash. He is held for the Yakima authorities.

### Man Held for Larceny.

Irvin Arnold, who has been employed several months as a ranch hand on a wheat farm near Pendleton, was arrested today by the sheriff on request from Sheriff A. G. Mohr, at Miller, S. D. Arnold is wanted there for larceny.

### Asks for Final Papers.

Carl Elnan Swanson, a native of Sweden, today filed application with the county clerk for final hearing for his U. S. citizenship papers. He will be heard on April 3, 1921, before the circuit court.

### Never's Decree Entered.

A decree of divorce for Bessie Never's from Walter Henry Never's was entered in the circuit court today. The plaintiff's name by former marriage, Bessie Louise Powell, was ordered restored to her.

### Sheriff Gets Suit.

A large milk can, copper coil and crude outfit for making moonshine of a very poor grade, were confiscated on the reservation yesterday afternoon by Sheriff Jinks Taylor and Deputy Bob Sinclair. The outfit, together with 50 gallons of mash and some bottles, was brought in for evidence. The materials were found on the place of Frank Teed and he will be required to explain the presence of the outfit on his ranch. The officers made no arrests.

### Land Case Settled.

A decree in the case of Oilco and Dan Lee and Viola Savoca vs. G. T. Lathrop, was signed by Circuit Judge G. W. Phelps Monday afternoon, following an agreement reached between attorneys in the case. The decree stipulates that the contract is void, that the plaintiffs have no claim to the 2440 acres of Morrow county land and the defendant no claim to the Umatilla county land involved in the contract for the proposed trade. The plaintiffs are ordered to give their joint note to the defendant for \$1000, payable in six months at 6 per cent interest. The agreement was signed by attorneys for both sides and accepted by Mr. Lathrop.

### Want Contract Cancelled.

William and Mary Jane Swash today brought suit against R. L. Adecock, seeking to have the contract between them for the lease of lots 2 and 6, Fruitvale Tracts, canceled. The defendant, they alleged, has damaged their property to the extent of at least \$250 by failure to plow properly and keep it clear of weeds, by failure to irrigate certain portions properly has caused \$750 additional damage; failure to spray fruit trees against spider pest has damaged them an additional \$500; failure to prune the trees properly has meant an additional \$250 damage and failure to pick and haul away the fruit crop of 1920 has caused additional damage estimated at \$500. In the suit they pray for a decree canceling the contract and adjudging damages in the sum that the court deems equitable.
