

### CHOLERA SEIZES RICH CHINESE PROVINCE AND TOLL HITS 1000 DAILY

#### Hundreds of Bodies Strwn on Streets and Carrying Coolies Fall Dead Attempting to Bear Caskets to Graves.

BY CHARLES EDWARD ROGUE (United Press Staff Correspondent.) CHENGTC, SZECHUEN PROVINCE, CHINA, Dec. 1.—Hundreds of bodies strewn on the streets, with carrying coolies falling dead while they attempt to bear caskets to the grave mounds, are some of the gruesome sights to be seen in China today.

Cholera has stricken this, the richest province in all China, and its wide-spread disaster is directly chargeable to the militaristic breakings, which have sent this ancient nation to the verge of disaster. With eight military factions engaged in outlaws, Szechuen province is in dire straits. Cities have been violated, residents outraged and the country districts thrown into such a state of panic that the farmers are afraid to bring their produce to the markets because of the menace of the roving bands of soldiers.

### GOLD PAPER WEIGHT FOR HEAD OF MEXICO

NOGALES, Ariz., Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—When Alvaro Obregon was inaugurated as President of Mexico in Mexico City today he was presented with a gold paper weight, the gift of the citizens of Nogales, Ariz. The paperweight is unique in that it is designed for adding a left-hand page to his papers. It is a reproduction in miniature of the international line between the United States and Mexico in the center of the twin cities of Nogales, Arizona, and Nogales, Sonora. The latter is the home and location of the business of President Obregon.

### GOON DIP, CHINESE IN SEATTLE, WOULD STOP SHOWING OF PICTURES

SEATTLE, Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—Goon Dip, Chinese consul, yesterday entered a protest against the showing of a picture purporting to portray the life of Chinese in America, at a local theater, claiming it is an insult to the Chinese. The showing of the picture was stopped by the police Saturday but was resumed on a temporary restraining order in superior court, secured by the theatre owners, prohibiting the police from further interference. Complaint was filed by the city attorney charging violation of a city ordinance prohibiting the showing of certain kinds of pictures.

### WAR VETERAN TAKES PHILIP TACOMA, WASH., Dec. 1.—Rev. J. Philip Anshutz, twice wounded in the world war where he served as chaplain with the 47th Infantry, has accepted the place as rector of Trinity Episcopal church. He held a rectorship in Billings, Mont., for 10 years and previously did missionary work among Indians in that state.

### DUNDEE AND JOHNSON DRAW NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—Johnny Dundee and Willie Jackson, New York lightweights, fought 10 rounds to a draw here last night. The judges disagreed and the referee made the decision.

# GRIDDLE CAKES and WAFFLES

#### Griddle Cakes with Eggs

- 3/4 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup melted shortening

Mix and sift dry ingredients; add beaten eggs, milk and melted shortening; mix well. Bake immediately on hot griddle.

#### Waffles

- 2 cups flour
- 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup melted shortening

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; add milk to yolks of eggs; mix thoroughly and add dry ingredients; add melted shortening and mix in beaten whites of eggs. Bake in well greased hot waffle iron until brown. Serve hot with maple syrup. It should take about 1 1/2 minutes to bake each waffle.

#### Buckwheat Cakes

- 2 cups buckwheat flour
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup melted shortening

Sift together flours, baking powder and salt; add liquid, molasses and melted shortening; beat three minutes. Bake on hot greased griddle.


