COMPARISON INVITED

With the exception of native ewes, the market for sheep at Chicago is in fair shape now, Mr. Smythe reported. From two to four cents a pound is paid for ewes, which is hardly enough to pay for freight.

Sheepmen will keep good sized flocks through the winter, Mr. Smythe said. The present fall season has been very favorable to them and the sheep are all in excellent condition. Even now, with December arrived, the sheep are on pasture and little or no feed has had to be given them. "The cost of keeping stock this winter will be only a third or a fourth as much as during the severe winter of 1919," Mr. Smythe estimated. "Hay last winter cost the stockman \$30 a ton and at this time of year there was snow and zero weather. So far no hay has been needed and it probably could be bought for about half the 1919 price."
