Eureka lodge No. 22, I. O. O. F., held election of officers for the first half of 1921 at its regular meeting Tuesday night. O. F. Stoelke was elected noble grand and John H. Gault vice grand. J. E. Rangers Do Road Work
C. L. Keithley, forest ranger, arrived here last night after doing road work with a group of nine foresters above Bingham Springs. The men, under the direction of J. C. Kuhns, supervisor of the Umatilla forest, have been cutting a road out of the side of the bluff. The work, Mr. Keithley says, is extremely difficult and only about 100 yards has been built. The intention of the forest service is to make the road a part of that to the summit. Mr. Keithley motored from Bingham Springs and says the roads are in very bad condition because of the continued rains of the past week.

Re-enlistments Numerous
Ex-navy men show a great interest in re-enlistment in this branch of the service, says P. R. Weaver, local recruiting officer. Several ex-navy men have enlisted here. Mr. Weaver reports that the number of enlistment per week for the past two months is 200 more than during the previous six months. He takes this as an indication that the enlisted personnel is contented with navy life and glad to sign up for another cruise, and the service is glad to have them back. In most cases the men who "ship over" are rated men who have made good. They are "16 year" men such as represent the navy in the local office.

Dress Forms Made
A dress form school held during the past two days at Pilot Rock was the most successful of the season, says Mrs. Edith G. Van Deusen, home demonstration agent. Eleven dress forms were made by the woman who met in the church basement. Mrs. Van Deusen reports that the Pilot Rock schools are soon to serve hot lunches, as are the Milton schools. Mrs. Van Deusen will go to Umatilla tomorrow to inspect 10 babies whose mothers are following directions given by Mrs. Van Deusen to combat malnutrition. The babies will be weighed each month to determine the progress made because of the use of the feeding plan.

Rainfall Below Normal
Despite the heavy rains during November, the total fall reached only 1.34 inches which is below the normal, 1.51, and also below last November's fall, 2.08. The greatest fall in 24 hours was November 26, when the precipitation was .50 of an inch. There were nine days in which there was .01 or more inches of rain, according to the records kept by Major Lee Moorhouse, official weather observer. Fifteen days were clear, others cloudy or partly cloudy. The maximum temperature was 85 on November 18. The minimum was 19, on November 6, 10 and 11. The minimum is higher than that of November, 1919, when some cold weather was experienced.

Indians Are Visitors
The annual evangelical meeting at the Tutuilla Indian mission which opened yesterday has brought many interesting Indian visitors. Among them is Harriet Kipitipelician, of Camal. He is a grandson of one of the Indians who went to St. Louis in 1820 asking for the "white man's book of heaven." Kipitipelician is accompanied here by his wife. Other visitors are Rev. and Mrs. Mark Arthur, and Sam Waters, of Spaulding's church, Lapwai; and Mrs. Thomas Isaacs and Allyn Jackson of Camal. The sessions open at 9:20 a. m. and continue until 2 p. m., opening again at 7:30 p. m. for an evening meeting. Rev. J. M. Cornellison, Presbyterian missionary at Tutuilla, says that he expects more visitors to arrive today.
