## NEWS OF THE COUNTY OFFICES AND OFFICERS

### Hermiston Couple Licensed.

Frank Louis Prater, of Hermiston, and Miss Ruth Smith, also of Hermiston, were issued a license to wed at the county clerk's office this afternoon.

### Young Given \$638.95 Judgment.

Judgment in the sum of \$638.95 and interest was given Fred R. Young against Bain & Kidd in the circuit court today. Sale under execution of a number of road implements now under attachment was ordered in the decree.

### John McPhail Sues on Notes.

John McPhail today filed suit in the circuit court against Cecilia Sampson to collect on three promissory notes alleged due. The first is for \$380, the second for \$20 and the third for \$13.50. Interest and costs is also asked. Peterson, Bishop & Clark are attorneys for the plaintiff.

### Woman Charges Cruelty.

Ruby E. Walker today filed suit in circuit court against John T. Walker asking divorce. She charges him with cruelty and alleges that she has been obliged to support herself and their four-year-old boy for several months. The couple was married in 1914 and the plaintiff asks the custody of the child. J. B. Perry is her attorney.

### Election Warrants Ready.

Warrants for officials who served in Umatilla county for the general election a month ago today, are ready at the office of the county clerk, that official announced today. There were 250 judges, chairmen and clerks and their pay, together with the mileage paid the clerks who brought the ballots to the county court house, aggregate \$3697.80.

### Claim for Damages Denied.

The claim of the O. E. Holdman Auto Co., against Umatilla county for damages, alleged due to a collision between a truck belonging to the claimant and some county road building materials, was disallowed by the commissioners today. The company alleged negligence on the part of the county in leaving a caterpillar and road scraper in the highway while the road to Pilot Rock was being repaired in September. The truck ran into the implements and was damaged to the extent of several hundred dollars. The commissioners today were busied with the auditing of claims against the county and attempted to clear up all back claims.

## COAST GROWERS AND SHIPPERS TO CONFER

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2.—(A. P.)—A conference of coast shippers and co-operative growers associations today was called by State Market Director Daniels here for December 29 for the purpose of meeting an alleged virtual embargo on western products through the sharp increase in transportation rates. Growers of California, Oregon and Washington have been invited.

## FISHERMAN WHO SAW PHANTOM SHIP, DIES

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Dec. 2.—(A. P.)—The burial yesterday of John Winters recalled to old-time fishermen a tradition of a modern Flying Dutchman and his ghostly crew that were believed to roam the seas in pursuit of a ship that had sent them to the bottom.

Winters was the last survivor of the crew of the Gloucester schooner Charles Haskell, which in a storm in March, 1869, ran down and sank a Salem schooner and its entire crew in Georges fishing banks. He died at the Fishermen's Snug harbor in his 82nd year, repeating almost to the last the tale of the ghost ship of the fishing banks, which was supposed to have pursued the Haskell throughout its career.

Once off Eastern Point, at the entrance of Gloucester harbor, Winters said a schooner ran down the wind hove alongside the Haskell, and her phantom crew climbed the rigging declaring themselves the ghosts of the Salem fishermen.

## Winters and others of the Haskell's crew refused to fish in the ship again and a new crew was taken on. These returned with a similar story of ghostly visitations at sea, took their dunnage bags and quit.

Another, and still a fourth crew was taken on, but each time a last with a renewal of the story of a ship, shrouded in white and spectral crew and the Haskell was hauled up, unable to get men. She finished her sojourn as a sand freighter, and the Salem ship was not heard of again.
