TRACK, FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL DATES OF COAST COLLEGES MADE

Schedule Gives Aggies Indoor Meet in April, Oregon the Championship in May and Washington Relay Carnival.

BERKELEY, Cal., Dec. 2.—(A. P.)—Football, basketball and track schedules of the Pacific coast conference were arranged here Wednesday by the executive committee of the conference and a committee was named to make a football schedule for the conference for the next six years, taking the 1921 schedule as the first year.

The conference indoor track and field meet was awarded to the Oregon Agricultural college of Corvallis, to be held April 9.

The 1921 track and field meet was voted for the University of Oregon at Eugene, and was scheduled for May 21.

The relay carnival of the conference will be held at Seattle April 23, under the auspices of the University of Washington. It was decided.

Delegates attending the meeting who represent schools in the northwest conference announced that the northern organization's annual track and field meet would be held at the Washington State college at Pullman, June 4.

PENDLETON FOOTBALL GAMES FOR 1921 WILL BE SOUGHT IN OREGON

Baker, La Grande, The Dalles, Hood River and Either a Portland or Valley Team Likely to be on List.

Football games for the 1921 Pendleton high school team probably will be scheduled late this month when the principals and superintendents of the state compete at Portland.

City Superintendent H. E. Inlow will attend this meeting with a side line of football dates to negotiate.

While Pendleton went through a successful season in the recent games, it had only two of its contests regularly scheduled.

With the exception of the Baker and La Grande dates, games had to be angled for during the early part of the season.

The result was that few Oregon teams were met.

Fasso, Touchet and Watsburg are Washington teams, while Milton, of about the same size school as those communities, put out a team of equal caliber.

The defeat of Milton helped establish the Pendleton claim for superiority in Eastern Oregon but Milton should be one of the early season contests for the locals.

There was a hitch in terms with The Dalles and as a result the mid-Columbia team pleases itself to lay claim also to the state title.

Inasmuch as there is no possibility of any post-season play, this claim cannot very well be settled.

Games with Baker and La Grande are assured for next year through a three-year agreement between the three schools.

It is likely that a two-year arrangement with The Dalles will be sought, games with Hood River obtained and either a Portland or Willamette Valley team lined up for a 1921 game.

Suggestion has been made that the state be divided into districts for the purpose of determining the state champions.

If such a division were made, the schools east of the Cascades probably would be grouped with about two groupings on the west side.

Regardless of what arrangements are made for the state as a whole, it is highly probable that Pendleton's opponents in 1921 will be almost entirely Oregon teams.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—(A. P.)—The Chicago American league baseball club will endeavor to build up its team, torn to pieces by the loss of seven stars through the baseball scandal at Waxahachie, Texas, that town having been announced today by Secretary Grabner as the training camp for 1921.

Manager William Gleason will leave for the training camp the first week in March and will take about 40 men with him, two-thirds of them being recruits purchased at the end of last season or during the winter.

Heretofore the club has left for its training camp about the middle of March but an earlier start will be made next spring so that Gleason will have a longer period in which to re-build the club.
