32,000 ATTENDANCE IS EXPECTED AT PASADENA FOR NEW YEAR CONTEST

Fast Football Predicted for Neither California Nor Ohio State Has Been Defeated During Present Year.

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 7.—(A. P.)—More than 32,000 people are expected to witness the Tournament of Roses football game here New Year's Day between the University of California and Ohio State College. Tournament Park, where the game will be played, seats 32,000 and, it is believed, every seat will be taken and additional spectators will be jammed into the standing room space.

Attendance records for western football games this season will be broken by the New Year's Day game, it is believed. The "big game" between Stanford University and California at Berkeley last month set the year's best mark at approximately 30,000. Later in November the game at Seattle between the University of Washington and Dartmouth College was attended by close to 30,000.

Fast, spectacular football will be witnessed in the Ohio State-California game, it has been predicted. Ohio State has been famous for years for its aerial attack and probably will give Pasadena an exhibition of clever forward passing. California this season has won most of its games by straight line smashing and end running and, on the defensive, has been able to block some of the best forward passers in the west. Both elevens are heavy and average close to the same weight, the California average being 182 pounds and the Ohio 181 1/2.

Neither Ohio State nor California has lost a game this year. California won the Pacific Coast Conference title by piling up a total of 482 points to its opponents' 14. Ohio State won seven games in a row.

According to reports from Berkeley, Coach "Andy Smith" will begin regular team practices December 15 for the game. The two weeks before the game will be spent in intensive practice.

Smith has a great deal of respect for Ohio State. "I honestly believe that Ohio State is the strongest team that has ever played at Pasadena and is much stronger than Harvard, Princeton or Yale," he has been quoted as saying.

ALL BOXING IS HALTED BY SAN FRANCISCO ON ACCOUNT OF OUTRAGES

Permits for Bouts Revoked in Retaliation for Attacks on Young Women by Prize-Fighting Thugs and Pals.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7.—(A. P.)—The San Francisco police commissioners last night stopped prizefighting in San Francisco. All permits for conducting fights or boxing contests were ordered suspended.

In a formal resolution the board of police commissioners declared:

"Owing to the unspeakable crimes which have been committed by prizefighters and their associates in this city, the board of police commissioners hereby suspends all prizefighting permits."

The action followed a conference yesterday of police officials with Mayor James Rolph, Jr., at which was detailed outrages committed by gangsters on young women recently at a shack rendezvous on Howard street in the thickly populated sections where a score or more women are declared to have suffered assaults and indignities.

Oakland to Require O. K.

Oakland, Calif., Dec. 7.—(A. P.)—All professional boxers appearing in Oakland would be required to furnish the city council and chief of police with certificates of good character under a resolution presented to the council today by F. F. Morse, commissioner of health and safety.

Recent activities of gangsters in San Francisco was declared responsible for the introduction of the measure. One of the demands is that all fighters have no criminal records.

Boxing Commission Silent

Cleveland, Dec. 7.—The Cleveland boxing commission last night declined to take any action against Pal Moore of Memphis and Carl Tremaine of Cleveland, bantamweights, for the cancellation of their scheduled 10 round bout here last Thursday night.

Kenworthy has played with major league clubs in Boston, Washington and St. Louis and with minor league clubs of Los Angeles, Seattle, Oakland and Denver. He also was with the Kansas City Federal League club.

Kenworthy succeeds his business partner, Clyde Wares, as the Seattle pilot. The two are interested in a Hanford, Cal., poolroom and when Wares decided not to return to the same post season he suggested Kenworthy for the post. The new manager was second baseman on the 1919 Seattle club which Wares piloted from the cellar to second place.

HOPPE HOLDS TITLE IN 18.2 BALK LINE GAME

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Willie Hoppe, holder of the world's 18.2 balk line billiards title, defeated Welker Cochran of San Francisco, 400 to 370, in the second game of the final round of the 12-balar tournament here last night. Cochran won in the afternoon from the other competitor, Jack Schaeffer of San Francisco.

Welker Cochran of San Francisco defeated Jake Schaeffer of San Francisco, 400 to 238, in the opening game in the afternoon of the final round of the national professional 18.2 balk line billiards tournament. The victory gave Cochran the right to meet Willie Hoppe, title holder.

Schaeffer's high run of 92 was the best of the game.

Three Cushion Title Up

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—August Kleckhefer of Chicago last night qualified for the finals for the national three-cushion billiard championship by defeating Pierre Maupome of Milwaukee in the preliminary matches. He won, 50 to 48 in 23 innings.

The victory gave Kleckhefer the third place prize of \$700, as well as the right to play in the finals against Robert Cannefax, present title holder.

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COAST LEAGUE SCRAPE INVESTIGATION FINISHED

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7.—(A. P.)—The investigation by the Los Angeles county grand jury of alleged "crookedness" in Pacific Coast league baseball games in 1919 was brought to a close Monday. It was announced last night, by Frank W. Stafford, deputy district attorney.

Two witnesses were heard Monday. They were Jesse Bean, clerk in a cigar store and Max Zimmer, a business man. Their testimony closed an inquiry extending over several weeks, that was begun after W. Baker (Babe) Dorton, former Verdon first baseman, made public allegations involving players on several teams.

HARVARD NOT TO PLAY ARMY

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 7.—(A. P.)—The Harvard football team will not play the army eleven next year, it was announced last night. The army refused to place the crimson on its schedule, Harvard authorities said, as the army did not promise a return game at West Point in 1922 on account of a faculty ruling.

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
