Pendleton Post, American Legion, is preparing to send out letters to its 172 members calling upon them to pay their dues for the year 1921. The annual charge is \$2, of which \$1 goes to the national organization for dues and subscription to the Legion Weekly, 75 cents to the state organization and 25 cents to the local post.

Dock Ridd Case Postponed

The trial of Dock Ridd in the U. S. district court at Portland set for yesterday, was postponed until Monday, according to Judge Thomas F. Gerald, city recorder, who returned on No. 4 last night. He was called to the metropolis to testify in the case against Ridd but was excused to return to his duties when the postponement was announced. He will go to Portland again on Sunday to be present at the trial Monday.

Hospitalization Committee Named.

The state organization of the American Legion has just named a committee on hospitalization, of which P. L. Idelman, of this city, is a member. The committee plans to send out cards to members of legion posts to be filled in with the name of any man known to be in need of government hospital service because of any disability contracted while in the service. Mr. Idelman asks that any persons knowing of former service men in need of such relief notify him.

Comrade Is in Germany.

One member of Pendleton Post, American Legion, is anxious to keep up his membership in the post although far away in Andernach, Germany, with the Army of Occupation forces. He is John C. Bryson, of headquarters company, 5th Infantry. He joined the local post after returning from overseas service and later resented in the army to be sent back to the Rhine. He is among the first of the members of the local post to inquire about dues for the coming year.

Favor "Buy a Barrel" Plan.

The Hermiston Commercial Association at its meeting yesterday endorsed the "Buy a Barrel of Flour" plan, says Fred Hession, county agent, who had lunch with the association yesterday. All members agreed to buy and promised to back the plan. The association voted also to recommend that the hay feature be added to the Northwest grain show which will be held in this city during the 1921 Round-Up week. A. K. Cobb, of the Boardman Association, and Cap Dobler, of Umatilla, who were present at the meeting, also favored the hay feature. The association also protested the present high cost of gasoline.

1000 Rabbits Killed.

A thousand rabbits were killed on Sunday in a rabbit drive at the G. W. Garrison place in Sarvia Canyon, 12 miles south of Echo, according to a report received today by Fred Hession, county agriculture agent. Last year Mr. Hession co-operated with west end farmers in constructing a fence for a rabbit drive, but by the time the fence was up the rabbits had fled. The fence was left and was used with success in Sunday's drive. Mr. Garrison reports that a great many rabbits ran back because of the small crowd of men to assist in the killing. He believes there are more rabbits in the Echo district this year than any year in the past. Poison, used so effectively in the Butte Creek and alfalfa regions, is less successful near Echo as the animals do not eat alfalfa. Poisoned wheat will probably be used later on.
