TEACHER LACK BARS 300,000 FROM SCHOOL

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—(A. P.)—Between 200,000 and 400,000 children were deprived of schooling last year as a direct result of the shortage of teachers, according to estimates made by P. P. Claxton, federal commissioner of education, in his annual report made public last night. No relief for the situation is seen by the commissioner who added that while from 110,000 to possibly 150,000 new teachers would be needed during the coming year, "we shall have at the outside 20,000 prepared teachers to fill vacancies or a deficit of at least 280,000."

SUED FOR DIVORCE

MILWAUKEE—Captain Wallace Schutz, an engineer of Milwaukee, has filed suit for divorce from Nadejda Troubetzkoy, because, as he claims, she already has one husband. Mrs. Troubetzkoy, said to be a Russian princess, and once called "the most beautiful Red Cross nurse in Europe," was married to a former officer of the imperial guard, a Russian prince. He was believed dead. Now Captain Schutz says he has been discovered to be alive and living in New York state.
