HARDING CONFERS WITH ROOT ON ASSOCIATION

MARION, Dec. 12.—(A. P.)—Senator Harding today conferred with Elihu Root regarding his proposed association of nations.

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HARDING AND HOOVER TALK OVER PROBLEMS

MARION, Ohio, Dec. 12.—(A. P.)—The league of nations deadlock and other problems to be faced by the next administration were talked over yesterday between President-elect Harding and Herbert Hoover, an advocate of the league, who came here as one of the first men to be summoned by Mr. Harding in his promised "meeting of minds."

"We went over about the whole gamut of world and national troubles," said Mr. Hoover after the conference, "and we solved none of them."

Besides the league, international conditions and European relations were the particular subjects on which the president-elect sought the advice of his visitor and there also were references to appointments Mr. Harding is to make in constructing his administration. Mr. Hoover frequently has been mentioned for possible membership in the cabinet, but he said today's discussion of appointments was casual and not conclusive.

FIRE AT WALTER REED HOSPITAL DEALS DEATH

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(A. P.)—One patient, Sergeant Alving Messenger, formerly of the Seventh Coast Artillery, is believed to have been burned to death and several other patients were injured, none seriously, Sunday, in a fire that destroyed two of the psychopathic wards of Walter Reed military hospital.

The fire, which hospital authorities believe was started by one of the patients with matches smuggled into his room, threatened for a time to spread

to other wards, including several in which disabled world war veterans are patients, was checked by the combined efforts of the hospital and Washington fire departments.

The two wards, 43, in which violently insane are confined and No. 44, in which other psychopathic patients undergo treatment, contained 75 patients. All, with the exception of Sergeant Messenger, were removed before the blaze gained much headway.

The loss was estimated as little more than \$25,000.
