Price of Turkeys

Not Yet Decided

The price for Christmas turkeys has not yet been decided upon, although local dealers expect that the fowls will sell at the same price as the Thanksgiving birds. There is some conflict between the price predicted in Portland and the price in Seattle.

Eggs are retailing at 75 cents a dozen and farmers receive the same price for them. Butter is 60 cents a pound and country butter is \$1.10 a roll.

Hogs Higher with Tops Weak

Cattle Steady; Sheep Unchanged

Arrivals of livestock for North Portland over Sunday totaled 76 cars, compared with 91 a week ago and but 17 cars a year ago when the cold snap was on. Hogs although higher in spots, were weak at the new top with one load at a premium. Cattle ruled steady with sheep about unchanged.

In the hog alleys there was evident manipulation on the part of some interests which had been compelled to go east and bring in outside supplies at a heavy freight rate. For one load

of hand picked stock a sale was made at \$114.45 but the general market was not quoted above \$12 and only one load went at that. In fact, the undertone of the swine trade appears slightly weaker despite these sales.

In the cattle alleys at North Portland the Monday trade indicated a steady tone with the market apparently on a healthy basis at the prices quoted. A few head of steers sold up to \$9 or 25 cents above the former prices but the movement at the new level was not sufficient to base quotations. At the same time one load of extra good heifers sold at \$7.25, which was a 25c premium above the general market.

Stock Market Values Are

Subjected to Depression.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—Values in the stock market were subjected to further drastic depression Monday. Losses of two to almost 10 points throughout the list being accompanied by transactions aggregating 1,400,000 shares, the largest total with few exceptions, of the year.

Observers once more attributed much of the selling to desire by corporations and individuals to adjust income tax losses prior to payment of the final installment of Wednesday, but the relentless character of the liquidation seemed to point to more pressing reasons.

The worst reported an extension of the general policy of retrenchment, with consequent slowing down of railway tonnage. Existing investment conditions found significant expression in the news that the banking syndicate to float \$20,000,000 to American woolen shippers had disbanded after failing to market its wares and the supply of time money was smaller than at any time since October.

Next to Central of New Jersey, which forfeited 15 points on comparatively few sales, the weakest stock was Royal Dutch at a net loss of 9 5/8. Other oils, also rails, steels, equipments, coppers, shippings and food issues, ended at losses of 9 to 5 points, final quotations in many instances being the day's lowest.

Weakness extended to the bonds market, virtually all domestic issues, especially convertible rails, yielding to enlarged offerings. Total sales, par value, \$20,250,000. Old U. S. bonds unchanged on call.

Bulls Get Active and

Wheat at Chicago Rises.

CHICAGO, Dec. 14.—Strength developed in the wheat market Monday largely as a result of buying based on opinions that bearish financial factors had discounted. Prices closed firm, 2 1/4 to 3 3/4 net higher, with December 1.63 3/4 and March 1.61 3/4. Corn gained 1 to 2 1/8 and oats 3/8 to 5/8. In provisions there was a setback of 15 to 47c.

Notwithstanding many elements of depression in sight at the opening, pressure to sell turned out to be much less vigorous than had been looked for. Shortly quickly took fright and soon all classes of traders began to show a decided preference for the bull side, the general assumption being that the comparative smallness of the volume of offerings indicated that the market had been oversold and that the effect of depressing influences had been anticipated so far as the wheat market was concerned. Much of the buying that ensued was credited to exporters

and there was also active demand for futures on the part of houses with country connections. Talk was current of a shortage of supplies later in the season unless prices advanced above an export basis.

Wet weather tended to give independent strength to corn and oats, provisions were weak.

RUSSIAN COUNT GETS

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—(A. P.)—Major General Count A. Chersov Spiridovich, former head of the Russian Imperial marine corps, was released from detention at Ellis Island yesterday and admitted to this country, after having been held by immigration authorities since Saturday.

At the preliminary inspection General Spiridovich had been unable to convince the authorities that he was not here to conduct anti-Jewish propaganda. A special inquiry board cleared him of this suspicion.
