**Deals on Stock Exchange**  
Are on Large Scale  
NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—Deals on the stock exchange again were on a large and comprehensive scale, totaling 1,275,000 shares but the strong and confident undertone was in striking contrast to the acute depression of the previous day. The money market was another stabilizing factor, call and time rates showing no deviation from recent quotations, despite the heavy shifting or transfer of funds arising from Wednesday's federal requirements.

Fundamental or basic conditions curtailing general trade and industry were unchanged and railway earnings continued disappointing. Oils were the outstanding feature, Mexican Petroleum closing at a net gain of 7 points and Royal Dutch recovering more than half of yesterday's loss at an advance of 4 1/2. In the steel, equipment, railroad, textile and food divisions advances of 2 to almost 4 points were largely retained, not a few final quotations being the highest of the session.

Weakness was confined to some of the motor specialties and metals, the latter casing on reports of another reduction in the price of refined copper. Trading in foreign exchange was at a minimum, but greater steadiness prevailed in rates to London and Paris, also to Spain and Northern Europe. Greed remittances, however, receding again. Bonds did not participate in the recovery of stocks, most issues including all the liberty group, easing fractionally to a point. Sales, par value, \$25, 159,900. Old U. S. bonds unchanged on call.

**Possible Aid to Farmers**  
Boosts Price of Wheat  
CHICAGO, Dec. 15.—Wheat prices advanced Tuesday, influenced more or less by action of the U. S. Senate looking to relief of farmers. The market closed unsettled 1 1/2 to 3 1/2 net higher with December 1.70 1/2 and March 1.64 1/2 to 1.45. Corn gained 1-3 to 1 1/4 and oats 1-3 to 3-8. In provisions the outcome varied from 29c decline to 10c advance.

Bulls in the wheat market received encouragement not only from steps taken to facilitate government aid to agricultural interests, but also from fresh signs that the period of liquidation in grain was at an end. Meat-while exporters and millers were said to be active bidders and Poland was credited with taking 750,000 bushels of wheat and 400,000 bushels of rye at the seaboard. Evening up of trades so as to be prepared for any surprise in the government crop report due after the close was a further bullish factor. Besides, country offerings were not large and were readily absorbed. An eastern house sold heavily in the last half hour but resistance proved stubborn and the market was rallying at the finish.

Corn and oats displayed some independent strength. Provisions averaged lower.
