Among the interned vessels was the Potosi of 5,040 tons, one of the largest sailing vessels afloat. She sailed recently for Europe for a full cargo of nitrate.

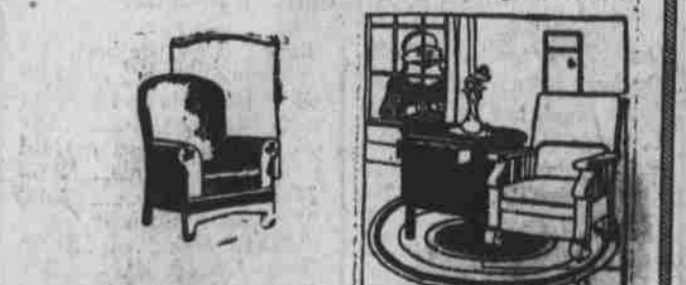
