## NATIONAL LEAGUE HEAD WILL SERVE UNTIL 1924

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—(A. P.)—The National league at its annual meeting Tuesday extended for three years the term of President John A. Heydler and granted to him a substantial increase in salary. President Heydler's present salary is \$10,000 a year and the increase, while it was not officially stated, is said to have been 50 per cent. The additional years will make his present term expire December 31, 1924.

The new agreement with the American league which is to run for 22 years, was adopted and formally signed by each of the eight clubs and president Heydler. The agreement was adopted without even the suggestion of an amendment.

A constitutional amendment was adopted which provides that when waivers are asked on players, the waivers may be withdrawn. Under the present rule when waivers are asked and a club puts in the claim for the player, the transfer must be consummated.

The league voted to recommend to the new advisory council created under the new agreement, that spiltball players now playing in the league be permitted to use that delivery until the end of their careers in the league.

## BORLESKE WOULD HAVE CONFERENCES DIVIDED

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 15.—(A. P.)—Organizations of four intercollegiate conference on the Pacific Coast, instead of the three now operated, has been proposed by Vincent Borleske, coach at Whitman College here. The present conference system, with some schools having membership in more than one, fails to provide a fair means of determining for western football, basketball, track and baseball championships, Borleske thinks.

Two of the proposed organizations would represent the north and the other two the south. One northern conference would include the University of Washington, University of Oregon, the Oregon Agricultural College, Willamette University and other Oregon and Washington schools west of the Cascade mountains. The other would operate east of the mountains and number Washington State College, the University of Idaho, Whitman College, University of Montana and others.

In the south, one California conference would control territory of the central portion of the state, with the University of California, Stanford University, Santa Clara University and others as members. The fourth organization would be in southern California and be made up of the University of Southern California, Pomona College and others.

At present the Pacific Coast Conference includes six of the larger institutions of the three coast states, with the Northwest Conference covering Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana. The third organization, the Southern California Conference, includes schools around Los Angeles. Champions of the proposed four conferences would play for their regional titles and the winners of the northern and southern organization titles would meet to decide the coast supremacy.

With the four conferences numbering schools located near each other, traveling expenses would be cut down and long trips done away with. Borleske thinks.

## DEMPESEY KEEPS TITLE BY KNOCKOUT IN 12TH

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—(A. P.)—Jack Dempsey, the world's heavyweight champion, knocked out Bill Brennan of Chicago last night in the 12th round of the first heavyweight championship fight staged in New York since the Walker law became operative.

There were many opinions expressed by flaccid fans as to Dempsey's inability to finish his opponent quickly. When Dempsey did cut loose, however, he certainly made a quick job of it, but it was not until after Brennan had shown that he was absolutely unafraid of the champion's punches and had split Dempsey's left ear with a right hook.

The champion proved to be Brennan's master in nearly every stage of the bout, but the challenger withstood many hard blows in the wind and rain through his magnificent physical condition.
