Plans to Rejoin Government
Paul Jones, state highway engineer who has been in charge of local work in this country for the past two years, plans to rejoin the government reclamation service as soon as final word is received from Washington ordering him to a location. He was formerly in this work and he expects to be sent to Powell, Wyo., where reclamation work is in progress. Most of the highway projects under way in this county have been completed.

League Is Organized
Pendleton, Hermiston, Heppner, Tule, Milton-Freewater, Umatilla, Gilliam county high school and Pilot Rock are the high school debating teams which comprise the Umatilla district, one of 12 in the state which will compete for the University of Oregon cup this year in the State League.

C. A. Stevens was issued a permit by the city recorder this morning to build a work shop on his property on Auro street. The building will cost \$250.

Four Branches Closed
Four training schools for members of the U. S. Navy are closed to recruits because enough men have been secured to fill the classes, says F. H. Weaver, local navy recruiting officer. The schools are for shipfitters, musicians, photographers and yeomen. Mr. Weaver advises men to enlist at once if they wish to have a choice of trade schools.

No Car Shortage Now
There is no shortage of cars in this vicinity at present, shippers declare. There is, on the contrary, a surplus, the condition being due to the fact that neither wheat nor lumber is moving in this state to any extent. Six months ago shippers were looking for cars in which to move their products but now the condition is somewhat reversed, the shippers declare.

Schools Will Have Cleaning
The city schools will undergo their usual vacation cleaning process during the Christmas holidays, which begins with the closing of schools tomorrow afternoon. In some rooms the desks will be refinished, the furnaces and flues will be cleaned, windows will be washed, woodwork cleaned and other necessary work attended to. Buildings will reopen January 3.

Parent-Teachers Will Meet
The Hawthorne Parent-Teachers Association will meet Friday, December 17 at 2:30. An interesting program has been planned, the principal feature to be a dramatization of the Courtship of Miles Standish given by the seventh grade pupils under the direction of Miss Leota Gagner. Mrs. Gertrude Nash assisted by the girls of the eighth grade will serve refreshments.

Ministers to Pay Two-thirds
Two-thirds fare on railroads instead of half fare will be charged ministers after January 1, 1921, according to word received yesterday by the local O. W. R. & N. office. Sisters of religious orders, who also have been permitted to travel on one-half the normal fare, will be required to pay a two-thirds fare also in accordance with the new ruling. Children's rates remain unchanged.

Quota is \$7,700
Umatilla county's quota in the campaign for funds for the starving children of Europe is \$7,700, according to announcement received by J. V. Tallman, county manager for the drive. The quota, Mr. Tallman states, is larger than that of any other county in the state and is based on Umatilla county's \$8,000,000 mark in the Liberty loan and war drives. To launch the county campaign, J. F. Robinson, associate director for European Relief, will be in Pendleton tomorrow and Mr. Tallman is arranging a meeting at the Elks building, at which time Mr. Robinson will explain the campaign.

Waste Paper to Be Shipped
A carload of waste paper will be shipped from Pendleton tomorrow by Penland Bros. to the Independent Paper Stock Co. of Portland. The load, which will consist of 20 tons, will be the first shipped since the local transfer company began collecting the paper. About 20 boxes have been distributed through Pendleton and the paper is collected in them and then baled. Five tons of the paper to be shipped tomorrow is from the local schools, which will receive \$14 a ton for magazines and \$8 a ton for newspapers in bundles. This is higher class paper than that collected from stores and for this reason the youngsters receive money for the paper. The funds are to be used for the benefit of the schools.

Good Program Planned
Hawthorne school will present a Christmas program on the afternoon of December 17, the last day before the beginning of the school holidays. The first and second grades will unite, and will give a program of games and music. There will be a Christmas tree. The third and fourth grade will have a Christmas tree and a program of recitations, songs, dialogues and folk dancing is being rehearsed. An entirely original program will be given by the fifth grade. The pupils have been divided into six groups, each of which will present an entertainment which will be a complete surprise to the teacher and to the pupils of the other groups. Christmas carols will be sung and Christmas recitations given in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades, which will also have a Christmas tree.

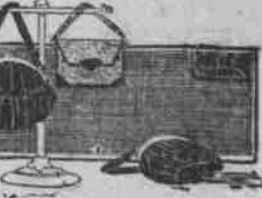
