**Ayers Sues on \$7915 Notes**  
Suit was brought in circuit court against W. E. Hanson Thursday afternoon by R. W. Ayres, to collect on five notes, aggregating \$7915. The notes were all given originally to Joe Kerley and are now in possession of the plaintiff. One note is for \$2500, a second for \$4990, a third for \$750, a fourth for \$145 and the fifth for \$500. Attorney fees asked are \$625. The place of business of the defendant here today was attached by the sheriff and was obliged to close its doors pending settlement of the case. Raley, Raley & Steiner represent the plaintiff.

**Grand Jury Still Adjourned**

**Sheriff Notified of Robberies**  
The sheriff's office today was notified of two robberies in this vicinity in the last two nights. A store at Hillgard was robbed of a large quantity of men's wearing apparel night before last and another at Taylor, Wash., was robbed last night. Local officers are on the lookout for possible clues here today but no arrests have been made.

A dozen pocket knives, two shotguns and other materials were stolen from the store of the Inland Empire Lumber Co., at Stanfield Wednesday night, according to the sheriff's office. Sheriff Taylor was in the west end of the county working on the case yesterday but did not make any arrests.

The Williams & Olinger Lumber Co., of Milton today filed suit against P. E. Johnson, seeking judgment for \$17,600 alleged due on a promissory note, and \$2155 for goods furnished by the plaintiff to the defendant. Peterson, Rishop & Clark represent the plaintiff.
