William De Mille Hammetts His Friends' Studios to Provide "Atmosphere"

TWO HOSTAGES KILLED IN REPRISAL PROGRAM

LONDON, Dec. 21.—(By Webb Miller, U. S. Staff Correspondent)—Two deaths are reported today as resulting from the military's new policy of using Sinn Fein prisoners as hostages. The prisoners are said to have been shot by soldiers near Cashel. The reason for the shooting is not announced. Sinn Feiners there were warned that troops hereafter will carry prisoners with them in all movements. Aside from this there were minor instances of violence, but none approaching the usual week-end disturbances to which Ireland has become accustomed in the last months.

Islands Are Raided

DUBLIN, Dec. 21.—(U. P.)—Military forces today raided the Aran Islands in a search for Sinn Feiners believed to be in hiding there. In a series of clashes, two fugitives were killed, three were wounded and seven were captured.

PLAN CAMPING GROUND

HELENA, Mont., Dec. 21.—(A. P.)—The Helena commercial club and the forestry service of the state are to unite next spring in building a camping ground at the summit of the Great Divide, according to an announcement here. The pass is known to hundreds of automobile travellers and is a favorite camping spot during the summer months. Ten acres of ground have been set aside and fireplaces, running water, benches and tables are to be built, according to plans.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Pendleton held at the Council Chambers in Pendleton, Oregon on December 8th, 1920 the following Resolution was duly adopted, viz:

WHEREAS, the City Surveyor of the City of Pendleton did on the 30th day of September, 1920, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council file in the office of the Recorder of the City of Pendleton, plans and specifications for an appropriation of improvement of the following named streets in said city: Jefferson Street from the North line of Jackson Street to the South line of Washington Street, and Washington Street from the East line of Madison Street to the West line of Main Street including the full intersection of Jefferson and Washington Streets, together with the estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement and the percentage of the total

cost of improvement, which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement, and

WHEREAS, the council has examined such plans and specifications and estimates and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefore to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work, and

WHEREAS, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is in the judgment of the Common Council properly to be included within such improvement district and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein, and

WHEREAS, the improvement of the hereinabove described portions of said street, either with Gravel Bitulithic Pavement, Concrete Pavement or Warrentite Bitulithic Pavement on Crushed Rock or Crushed Gravel foundation, is at this time necessary, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve said portions of said Jefferson and Washington Streets by paving the same with either Gravel Bitulithic Pavement, Concrete Pavement or Warrentite Bitulithic Pavement on Crushed Rock or Crushed Gravel foundation such pavement to be constructed and the surface thereof to be finished upon the established grade of said street and the street to have curbs and gutters and all other things in accordance with and as shown in the plans and specifications for the improvement of said portions of said Jefferson and Washington Streets, prepared by F. B. Hayes, City Surveyor, filed with the Recorder of said city on the 30th day of Sept., 1920, which said plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to, and be it further,

RESOLVED that the Engineer's estimates of the probable total cost of such improvement, which said City Engineer's estimates were made and prepared by F. B. Hayes, City Surveyor of said city, in the sum of \$5553.40 and were filed with the Recorder of said city on the 30th day of Sept., 1920, is hereby included and hereby referred to particularly, and be it further,

RESOLVED that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvement, as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 30th day of September, 1920, be and they are hereby adopted and approved, and be it further,

RESOLVED that the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land, so specially benefited by such improvement shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof, and be it further,

RESOLVED that an assessment district is hereby created to be known as "Assessment District No. 73, embracing the property benefited and to be assessed for the payment of such improvements, which Assessment District shall include all lots, parts of lots, and parcels of land lying and being within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit: Description of Assessment District No. 73

Commencing at the Southwest corner of Lot 6, Block 6, Switzer's Add to Pendleton, thence 250 ft. North parallel with the West line of Jefferson Street; thence West 100 feet and parallel with the South line of Washington Street; thence North 150 feet and parallel with the West line of Jefferson Street; thence East 100 feet and parallel with the North line of Washington Street; thence North 100 feet and parallel with the West line of Jefferson Street; thence East 250 feet and parallel with the North line of Washington Street; thence South 100 feet and parallel with the East line of Jefferson Street; thence West 250 feet on the North line of Jackson Street to the point of beginning.

And be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution together with the notice that the surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land is on file in the office of the City Recorder be published for a period of ten days in the East Oregonian, which newspaper is hereby designated by the Common Council for the publication thereof.

And further notice is hereby given that the Surveyor's estimate of the cost of said proposed improvement to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land on account of said proposed improvement is now on file in the office of the City Recorder, subject to inspection and examination.
