NOTICE OF PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of The City of Pendleton held at the Council Chambers in Pendleton, Oregon on December 8th, 1920 the following Resolution was duly adopted, viz: WHEREAS, the City Surveyor of the City of Pendleton did on the 20th day of September, 1920, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council file in the office of the Recorder of The City of Pendleton, Plans and specifications for an appropriation improvement of the following named streets in said city: Jefferson Street from the North line of Jackson Street to the South line of Washington Street, and Washington Street from the East line of Madison Street to the West line of Main Street including the full intersection of Jefferson and Washington Streets, together with the estimate of the cost to be done and the probable cost thereof with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement and the percentage of the total cost of improvement, which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement, and, WHEREAS, the council has examined such plans and specifications and estimates and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefore to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work, and, WHEREAS, the property recommended by the City Surveyor, to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is in the judgment of the Common Council proper to be included within such improvement district and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein, and, WHEREAS, the improvement of the hereinabove described portions of said street, either with Gravel Bitulithic Pavement, Concrete Pavement or Warrentite Bitulithic Pavement or Crushed Rock or Crushed Gravel foundation, is at this time necessary, therefore, be it, RESOLVED by the Common Council of The City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve said portions of said Jefferson and Washington Streets by paving the same with either Gravel Bitulithic Pavement, Concrete Pavement or Warrentite Bitulithic Pavement or Crushed Rock or Crushed Gravel foundation such pavement to be constructed and the surface thereof to be finished upon the established grade of said street and the street to have curbs and gutters and all other things in accordance with and as shown in the plans and specifications:

for the improvement of said portions of said Jefferson and Washington Streets, prepared by F. B. Hayes, City Surveyor, filed with the Recorder of said city on the 20th day of Sept., 1920, which said plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to and be it further, RESOLVED that the Engineer's estimates of the probable total cost of such improvement, which said City Engineer's estimates were made and prepared by F. B. Hayes, City Surveyor of said city, in the sum of \$4522.46 and were filed with the Recorder of said city on the 20th day of Sept., 1920, is hereby included and hereby referred to particularly, and be it further, RESOLVED that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvement, as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of The City of Pendleton on the 20th day of September, 1920, be and they are hereby adopted and approved, and be it further, RESOLVED that the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land, so specially benefited by such improvement shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof, and be it further, RESOLVED that an assessment district is hereby created to be known as "Assessment District No. 73, embracing the property benefited and to be assessed for the payment of such improvements, which Assessment District shall include all lots, parts of lots, and parcels of land lying and being within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit: Description of Assessment District No. 73 Commencing at the Southwest corner of Lot 6, Block 6, Switzer's Addition to Pendleton, thence 250 ft. North and parallel with the West line of Jefferson Street; thence West 100 feet and parallel with the South line of Washington Street; thence North 160 feet and parallel with the West line of Jefferson Street; thence East 100 feet and parallel with the North line of Washington Street; thence North 100 feet and parallel with the West line of Jefferson Street; thence East 260 feet and parallel with the North line of Washington Street; thence South 100 feet and parallel with the East line of Jefferson Street; thence East 100 feet and parallel with the North line of Jefferson Street; thence South 100 feet and parallel with the East line of Jefferson Street; thence West 260 feet on the North line of Jackson Street to the point of beginning. MILLS MUST PROTECT FAITHFUL EMPLOYEES. TOPENKA, Dec. 22.—(U. P.)—Flour mills in Kansas which have curtailed production must take care of faithful and skilled employes during the period of industrial depression, so that these employes may provide living for their families, the Kansas court of industrial relations ruled in an opinion. The court held that flour mills which had curtailed production were not operating on such a scale as to affect the public and ruled that the mills had a right to curtail production due to market conditions over which they have no control. However, faithful employes must be taken care of, the court decided.
