DUBLIN, Dec. 22.—(A. P.)—A big raid on a mail train was reported from Charleville, County Cork. Fifty armed and disguised men held up the crew of the train at the station and removed 12 mail bags, which later were recovered in a head-on collision. Two of the bags had been emptied. The sergeant commanding the force which recently successfully resisted an attack on the Ballinacree, County Longford police barracks, was said to have received today the following anonymous communication: "Congratulations on your fight, but do not think you will escape."

COMING OF WITNESS FOR IRELAND BLOCKED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(A. P.)—Mrs. Annote Robinson, of Manchester, England, secretary of the British branch of the Women's International League, told the commission investigating Irish conditions that American Consul Wells at Manchester attempted to prevent her from coming to America to testify by refusing to issue her passport. She obtained a visa after visiting the American embassy and promising not to engage in propaganda or give interviews to the American press.

Hermiston Couple Licensed.
A marriage license was issued by the county clerk Tuesday afternoon to Charles C. Spencer and Miss Vella Gertrude Thomas, both of Hermiston.

Lumber Company Files Suit.
The J. C. Ballinger Lumber Co. today brought suit in circuit court against H. L. Pearson to recover \$12,146, the balance alleged due for lumber sold the defendant. The plaintiff is represented by Haley, Raley & Steiwer and H. J. Warner.

D. C. Bowman Starts Action.
D. C. Bowman today filed suit in circuit court against William Hiddings to recover \$67.50 which he alleges is due for three tons of hay sold the defendant at an agreed price of \$22.50. Haley, Raley & Steiwer and H. J. Warner represent the plaintiff.

Moonshiners Bowed Over.
Charles and Bud Reed, charged with operating a still and having liquor in their possession on an Indian reservation, were arraigned and waived preliminary examination before U. S. Commissioner S. A. Newberry today. They were bound over to the federal grand jury in bond of \$500 each which they gave. Deputy U. S. Marshal Robert Carter was here from Portland to bring the men before the commissioner.

Kerley Hearing Is Tomorrow.
The preliminary hearing before Justice Joe H. Parkes of the case of William E. Hanson vs. Joe Kerley, charging the latter with embezzlement of \$5,599, will be held tomorrow at 2 o'clock. The suit is the outgrowth of a suit and attachment against Mr. Hanson by R. W. Ayers, who purchased several notes which had been given to Mr. Kerley by Mr. Hanson and which the latter claims to have paid and obtained a receipt for. The state will prosecute the case while Peterson, Bishop & Clark will defend Mr. Kerley.

Beggar Fined at Milton.
John Pratt, charged with begging, was fined \$50 and costs in the justice court at Milton on Tuesday and was brought to the county jail last evening by Sheriff W. R. Taylor to serve out the time at the rate of \$2 a day, inasmuch as he was unable to pay the fine. Pratt had collected \$21.25 from Milton families, having a subscription list which some of them mistook for a Red Cross list. He was not, however, representing himself as a Red Cross solicitor, nor was he ordered to return the money he had collected. District Attorney R. L. Keator said today. Mr. Keator went to Milton to prosecute the case, which was one of begging and was listed as vagrancy.

SEATTLE, Dec. 22.—Incomplete returns from the special election held in the 37th Capital Hill district, for the selection of a state senator to succeed Geo. B. Lamping, recently elected port commissioner of Seattle, indicated the election for former State Senator E. B. Palmer, republican, by a large lead over his farmer-labor party opponent, Joe Smith.

TOLEDO BANDITS AGAIN STRIKE TERROR IN CITY

TOLEDO, Ohio, Dec. 22.—(A. P.)—Bandits continue to terrorize Toledo citizens yesterday, following a \$14,500 robbery Monday night at the offices of the American Railway Express company in which 10 guards were overpowered by six masked men armed with shotguns. Shortly before noon yesterday three automobile bandits kidnaped W. O. Baldwin, bookkeeper for the Ohio Dairy company, and took him to the outskirts of the city where they threw him from their car after robbing him of \$520. After being overcome with ether, Mrs. W. W. Simmons was bound and gagged by two masked men, who looted the home of everything of value. Mrs. Simmons is said to be in a critical condition from the shock. Several other homes and street robberies were reported to the police.
