SALEM, Dec. 22.—(A. P.)—The supreme court yesterday decided six eastern Oregon cases heard in Pendleton in October. It affirmed two from Union county and two from Baker. It dismissed one from Gilliam and denied one petition for rehearing. It wants details of 150.

MARTENS SAYS HE WILL SURRENDER ON JAN. 3

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(U. P.)—Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, bolshevik ambassador to the United States, notified the labor department he would surrender himself on January 3 for deportation under the recent ruling of Secretary of Labor Wilson and that he is in this country in violation of the immigration law.

U. S. OFFICIALS REAPED COAL PROFITS, CHARGED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(U. P.)—A charge that United States government officials made great profits in dealing in coal was made before the senate investigating committee by George Cushing, director of the American Wholesale Coal Association. Cushing was immediately urged by members of the committee to go into details of the charges, but he refused. He said he may later give information to support his charge to the committee, but declared he was absolutely certain of his statements.
