NEWS OF THE COUNTY OFFICES AND OFFICERS

Judgment of Non Suit Entered
A judgment of non suit in the case of the State Industrial Accident Commission against the Burns Machine Works, Inc., was filed with the county clerk by the circuit judge today.

Hamley & Co., Bring Suit
Hamley & Co., today brought suit against Mitchell Thompson to receive \$111.50, alleged due for goods furnished the defendant and for which payment is past due. George W. Courts represents the plaintiff.

Forfeiture Notices Go Out
Notices of the forfeiture of registration are being mailed by the county clerk to all registered voters in the county who have failed to vote in their home precinct in any of the last

four elections. The period of time covered is two years and the law decrees that when one fails to vote for that time his registration shall be cancelled. If a voter returns word within 10 days, however, that he is still a resident of that precinct, his registration is not cancelled. The clerk expects that more names will be purged from the registration books as a result of the working of this law than were added by swearing in at the recent general election.

Tatum Sues for \$552.42
The Dean Tatum Co., today filed suit in circuit court against Leo Sampson to recover \$552.42, alleged due for groceries delivered the defendant between Jan. 1, 1919 and Nov. 6, 1929. J. L. Perry represents the plaintiff.

One File for Final Papers
Fred Walters, local mill owner, on Wednesday filed with the county clerk his application for final U. S. citizenship papers. Mr. Walters entered the United States on August 28, 1879 and is a native of Switzerland.

I. M. Schanney, county judge-elect, R. E. Bean, county commissioner-elect and Zed Houser, sheriff-elect, have all taken their oath of office before County Clerk R. T. Brown and the last named has filed his bond. R. O. Hawks, assessor-elect, has neither filed his bond nor taken his oath of office as yet. All the other county officials were re-elected.

Paper Work is Heavy
Paper work, which takes considerable of the time and attention of the sheriff's office, is heavier now than in years, according to the officers. Notices of attachment, summonses to appear before the circuit court or the grand jury and other civil service are coming to the office in larger quantities than usual. Sheriff Taylor went to the Milton-Freewater country today to serve a large number of papers and Deputy Joe Blakely went to the reservation district on a like mission. With the grand jury called for January 2 and the January term of circuit court coming up the paper work is expected to remain heavy during the rest of the year.

VON HOLLWEG'S DREAM OF SCHOOL COMES TRUE

BERLIN, Dec. 23.—(A. P.)—A German school of political science, the dream of the former Chancellor, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, long before the world war, at last has been established in Berlin. The dedication of the new school was made the occasion for much congratulatory talk by high German officials who expressed the opinion that a line of statesmen would be developed by the new institution to direct the progress of the German republic toward its former high place among the nations.

Foreign Minister Simons in an address declared German statescraft had always lacked trained leaders thoroughly schooled in political science and for that reason the people had had small faith in their officials. He hoped that the new school would help establish such a faith.

Plans are to operate the school along the lines of the Ecole Libre de Sciences Politiques of Paris.

IRELAND PEACE DEAL IS NOT CALLED OFF

DUBLIN, Dec. 23.—(A. P.)—There is no truth in the rumors that negotiations for peace in Ireland have been broken off. The Associated Press is authoritatively informed. There has been only a lull in the peace discussions and the belief is expressed that the negotiations soon will be resumed with good prospects of success.

It is reported that Archbishop Clune has returned to London for further consultations with the premier. The archbishop on his previous trip to London is said to have obtained from the premier an outline of the terms on which the government is ready to arrange a truce with the republican army and some idea of the conditions the government is prepared to grant the Sinn Fein for a settlement of the question of independence.
