**NAT GOOWIN'S FIANCEE GIVEN HIS BELONGINGS**

**SANTA NEEDS PLANE OR MAYBE ROWBOAT**

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—(A. P.)—Miss Georgia L. Gardner, who was engaged to become the sixth wife of Nat Goodwin, actor, is the rightful owner of the contents of the apartment which belonged to Goodwin at the time of his death. This decision was handed down today by Surrogate Cohalan, who at the same time ruled that Nathaniel C. Goodwin of Boston, the actor's father, as administrator of his son's estate, must file an accounting for a judgment of \$15,374 collected by the actor and turned over to the father before his death.

The decisions were made upon objections filed by Klaw & Erlanger, theatrical producers, who sought to collect a claim of \$11,000 against the estate. Testimony was introduced to show that the actor gave Miss Gardner his personal belongings in appreciation of her kindness to him during his last illness.

**ADVERTISING MAN DIES**  
PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 24.—(A. P.)—Volstan Dixey, a widely known advertising man, was killed here Friday when he was struck by a motor truck. He was about 55 years old. At one time Mr. Dixey was editor of Printers' Ink.

**OIL TANKER COMPLETE LOSS**  
HOUSTON, Texas, Dec. 24.—Advices received by the Southern Pacific general offices in Houston yesterday stated that the tanker Hastinal, belonging to the National Oil Co., lying near Pier A of the Southern Pacific docks would be a total loss.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—(A. P.)—Santa Claus on his visits to the homes of American children tonight will be compelled to resort almost completely to an airplane or some similar new-fangled conveyances, for the weather bureau forecast a snowless Christmas for almost the entire United States.

"Fair and cold," was the weather forecaster's general prediction. The only snow of sufficient depth for the sleigh of the Christmas Santa, the bureau said, would be in Wisconsin, Northern Michigan, Northern New York and Northern New England where snow fell early in the week and has not melted. There may be some new snow in the northern Rocky mountain region, it was said, but elsewhere the fall will be confined to furies.

The Pacific coast was excepted from the forecast for fair weather, the charts and maps of the weather bureau showing that rain and generally unsettled weather might be expected west of the Rocky mountains.
